This made the Cram men feel good and they were encouraging him to hurry up. By the time the last round was made the Cram horse was a quarter of a mile in the lead, and the talent were broke. We had just a passing glance. One could hear tended to. expressions of suprise and wonder that Crook county had so many resources. It is an eye opener to
