Concerning Agency Plats.

"About twenty-five families will spend the winter on their claims at Agency Plains," said Timothy Brownhill, who has just returned from there. "The weather so far has not been cold; about the same temperature as in The Dalles. We haven't lacked for water," said he, "since the rains began, and everybody has faith enough to believe before next fall there will be an abundance of water struck. R. E. Saltmarsh, whose place is about a quarter of a mile from J. H. Jackson's, has a fine spring on his land and several others have been as fortunate." Mr. Brownhill is still boring, having gone down forty-seven feet. It is slow work on this land, but he is not in the least discouraged.

Speaking of the roads out that way he said he thought it would be well for the county to take up the matter of improving the road

across the Warm Springs Agency with the agent, as in many places they are almost impassable. The soil partaking somewhat of the nature of adobe fairly clogs the wheels. By adding crushed rock or gravel, however, they make splendid roads.

Coming nearer home he spoke of the terrible condition of the road at Eight Mile, near the Benson place, and said it was the worst piece of road he encountered on the trip and should be improved. "The Dalles has no idea how much trade she loses by the condition of her roads. Settlers out that way are compelled to make the trip to Shaniko, where the roads are in much better condition for travel."

Mr. Brownhill but echoes the complaint of dozens of others on the same question.—Dalles Chronicle

Notice to Electric Customers.

Your attention is called to the monthly lighting rates, which will be found in the last part of Section 10, Ordinance 122, which reads as follows:

Evening until 10 p. m., .05 per candle power; evening until midnight, .06 per candle power. All night lights .08 per candle power. Residences, churches and halls special rates. Residences were given a .04 rate for this reason. They are supposed not to burn their lights only when in actual use, and in no case to burn lights all night in unoccupied rooms.

Beginning November 1st, 1902, we will charge an .08 rate on all night lights unless permission has been granted for same.

We positively will not furnish current to lights not purchased from P. L. & W. Co. Where this fraud is found to exist service will be discontinued without notice.
