

Governor Taft's report contains five suggestions. The establishment of a gold standard with bank corporations empowered to issue bank notes. A 75 per cent reduction in duties on goods imported into this country. An amendment to the Philippine act increasing the amount of land that may be held by an individual or corporation. Also allowing an individual or corporation to hold more than one mining claim. That all bonds issued by the Insular Government may be free from state, etc., taxes in the United States. And, that a fixed and limited number of certified Chinese skilled laborers be admitted under a head tax of not exceeding \$50, and bonds to employ a Filipino apprentice for each Chinaman. "The Commission thinks unlimited admission of Chinese would be unwise."

The base of Philippine civilization in the past was ladronism, and the present conditions are most favorable for its growth and maintenance. It is not certain whether in the depressed state of agriculture, with the temptations to ladronism, the constabulary will be able, without the assistance of the military, to stamp it out. Were there temptations to agriculture, were there prosperous conditions in the country, it would not be a troublesome matter to deal with, but when want and famine are staring people in the face the life of the freebooter forms to the desperate and the weak a very great attraction.

The above is undoubtedly the opinion of the entire Commission, and they know that from \$6.50 to \$7.50 per month will secure industrious and willing labor in the Philippines, but they propose to encourage ladronism by importing a fixed and limited number of Chinese, who are certified to be skilled laborers. According to Professor Jenks \$6 per month in silver seems a fair pay for Chinese under contract. And in view of the fact that about 90 per cent. of the water buffalo in the islands have died from rinderpest, almost destroying rice growing, it does not seem desirable that for a possible saving of \$2 per month Chinese labor should be allowed to take opportunity for labor and wages from Filipinos who would not go into ladronism if it were not for poverty and idleness.

If we wish to help the Filipinos, the people of the United States, and of the whole world, we should build railroads, particularly during this time of scarcity that inevitably follows the almost complete destruction of farm animals. If our Reformers and Anti-Imperialists fear that "some American may get rich" thereby, why not favor building with ownership by Government?

For Relief of Settlers.

Representative Mondell, of Wyoming, Monday introduced a general bill repealing the conflicting and largely obsolete statutes relating to the use and appropriation of timber on the public domain, and providing in simple terms for the free use of timber from public lands by settlers, miners, prospectors, etc., and for the sale after advertisements of the timber from the unreserved and unappropriated public lands. It does not in any way conflict with the laws relating to the sale of public timber lands under the timber and stone act.

Under the Mondell bill, settlers, prospectors and others will be allowed to cut timber free of cost from the public domain for use for firewood, fencing, building purposes, and for development of their lands, its mineral and other resources, but one person is not to exceed stumpage value of \$50 per annum, which, at the usual stumpage valuation made by the Interior Department, would give them from 50,000 to 100,000 feet, board measure.

At present under a decision rendered a year and a half ago, there is no way in which timber on public lands can be purchased, the department having held that the

statute under which sales had been made for many years previous did not authorize such sales. At this time those operating sawmills for the purpose of supplying the wants of neighborhoods and those desiring timber for purposes for which the free use of timber is not allowed, and who are not able to buy under the timber and stone act, find it impossible to secure timber legally.

Pullman Ordinary Sleepers.

The tourist travel between the east and the Pacific coast has reached enormous proportions in the last few years, and calls for a special class of equipment. To meet this demand the Pullman Co. has issued from its shops what it technically calls the "Pullman Ordinary Sleeper." These cars appear similar to the regular sleeper, being built on the same plan, but not furnished with the same elegance.
