marily rich in Carbonates, the active replacing agent being primary Carbon, the substance ordinarily forming first as an oil, but on exposure losing some ingredient and hardening as a consequence. Calcite, secondary in these rocks, also alters to Bitumen. Under these conditions of occurrence, at points where the proper rocks are developed to a sufficient thickness and the necessary physical conditions exist, oil may be had. Favorable conditions exist near the town of Prineville, and on the Crooked river in the south eastern portion of the county, and the intelligent boring of wells at these points is to be advised.
