Upon the doctors' recommendation she was committed by the county court to the state hospital for the insane. Ben Jones and Miss Harrington were appointed by the county court to escort Mrs. Davis to Salem and left Saturday.

The county court has secured power for the use of Dr. Hyde, the physician, who will vaccinate all who care to be. Those not able to pay for the service will be accommodated free of charge, and it is the desire of the authorities that they be vaccinated at the very earliest opportunity.

Notice to Stockmen.

We, the citizens of Ochoco respectfully request the sheep men to respect the range enclosed by the following described boundary lines viz:

Commencing at the mouth of Marks creek thence up Marks creek to the mouth of little Hay creek, thence up little Hay creek to the head or better known as the old Miller ranch thence on a line running in an easterly direction to the McClester house or placer mine on Ochoco creek thence on a line running in a south easterly direction to the old Pessley ranch on Canyon creek continuing on the summit of Lookout Mountain and along the summit of Lookout Mountain to the dividing ridge between the head waters of Woole creek and Heaven-haven creek thence along the above named ridge running in a westerly direction to the head of Camp branch thence down Camp branch to its mouth and place of beginning.

Suggestions on Smallpox.

During the present epidemic of smallpox with which our community is afflicted, it is advised that the citizens do not congregate together either at church, lodge or entertainments of any kind, but to remain quietly at home and refrain from violent exercises and excesses of all kinds, especially in the matter of drink and food. That they thoroughly disinfect their houses, clothing, furniture, etc., with a preparation of Formaldehyde, one tablespoonful to one pint of water, with which to spray themselves, clothes, etc; also disinfect all sinks drains, privies and outbuildings with Chloride of Lime, also take internally Sulphur and Cream of Tartar equal parts mixed with syrup, take teaspoonful at bedtime. Preserve a peaceful and tranquil frame of mind, reasoning that the germs of disease are more likely to attack a person who is excited and alarmed.

The only prevention we know of at the present time is vaccination, which has stood the test of over 100 years, and now is fully endorsed by all intelligent persons throughout the civilized world. It is recommended by the Board of Health that every person in this county who has not been vaccinated within six months shall be vaccinated immediately.

All cases of fever, accompanied by chills, headache and backache, with or without eruption, must be reported to the Health Board immediately so that the proper steps may be taken to investigate and determine the nature of the disease.

Quarantine and all necessary sanitary Regulations will be strictly enforced.

We hope and expect to receive the hearty, earnest co-operation of all to aid us in stamping out this dread disease.
