The county court has secured permits for the use of Dr. Hyde, the county physician, who will vaccinate all who care to be. Those not able to pay for the service will be accommodated free of charge, and it is the desire of the authorities that they be vaccinated at the very earliest opportunity.

### Suggestions on Smallpox.

During the present epidemic of smallpox with which our community is afflicted, it is advised that the citizens do not congregate together either at church, lodge or entertainments of any kind, but to remain quietly at home, and refrain from violent exercises and excesses of all kinds, especially in the matter of drink and food. That they thoroughly disinfect their houses, clothing, furniture, etc., with a preparation of Formaldehyde, one tablespoonful to one pint of water, with which to spray themselves, clothes, etc; also disinfect all sink drains, privies and outbuildings with Chloride of Lime, also take internally Sulpur and Cream of Tartar equal parts mixed with syrup, take teaspoonful as bedtime. Preserve a peaceful and tranquil frame of mind, remembering that the germs of disease are more likely to attack a person who is excited and alarmed.

The only prevention we know of at the present time is vaccination, which has stood the test of over 100 years, and now is fully endorsed by all intelligent persons throughout the civilized world. It is recommended by the Board of Health that every person in this county who has not been vaccinated within six months shall be vaccinated immediately.

All cases of fever, accompanied by chills, headache and backache, with or without eruption, must be reported to the Health Board immediately so that the proper steps may be taken to investigate and determine the nature of the disease.

Quarantine and all necessary sanitary regulations will be strictly enforced. We hope and expect to receive the hearty, earnest co-operation of all to aid us in stamping out this dread disease.
