It is to be hoped, however, that all existing differences between the two factions can be settled in a peaceful manner without a useless sacrifice of life.

The First Presbyterian Church of Bend was organized Monday the 20th. It starts out with a membership of ten persons. Money to the amount of over \$500 was secured by local subscription for the erection of a building with the understanding that it was to be open to all religious denominations when not needed by the Presbyterians. Dr. A. W. Holt and Rev. Alter did good work in securing this much needed addition for Bend and it is to be hoped that the good work will continue.

What came very near being a runaway was luckily avoided last week. Arch Powell had left his team standing in front of the house while he went inside for a few minutes. One of the horses got his foot over the neck yoke and commenced plunging madly to get free. He got tangled up in the harness and fell down. The siege of smallpox made a perceptible difference in the school report of Crook county, which says there were 1397 persons of school age in the district according to the last census, against 1262 last year; but only 61 teachers were employed against 72 last year while the total number of days attendance this year was 52,244 against 64,857 last year. There were three new organized districts in the county and two new school houses. On account of the outbreak of smallpox in the county no local institutes were held, which also accounts for the falling off in the attendance.—Dallies Chronicle.

They also visited Mr. and Mrs. James Cram and report having had an enjoyable time. Mr. and Mrs. Biggs will be glad to welcome them back at any time during the hay season.

He Enjoyed Himself.

A typical exhibition of life in the wild west 20 years ago, was furnished to a few of our citizens who happened to be around at the time, free of charge. A young man from the Bear creek foothills had taken one too many and getting his horse proceeded to show us some fast and crooked riding up and down Main street. The city marshal objected to this form of amusement without a license and laid in wait for the performer as he was making a fancy turn around the corner at Wurzwiler & Thompson's store. He tried to knock him off the horse with his rein, but missed him by an inch. It broke up the performance, however, as the rider left the city for his happy home at Bear creek.

Two days later.—The performer was found two days later at Dry creek by a party passing that way. He had a couple of bottles left and was sound asleep under the protecting shade of a juniper. When asked which bottle had the best whiskey he said in a tired way, "Well I guess they are all the same." There is no doubt he will arrive home safely as soon as the supply of refreshments run out.

The Timber Situation.

A little over a year ago the first rush for timber land in this county commenced. At that time a great many of our local people laughed at the idea that inside of a year all the available timber in Crook county would be taken, yet it has only been a little over a year and now if one secures a claim it is an isolated one and in fact, there is very little vacant timber in eastern Oregon. About all that is now left is a little in the Silver Lake country and it is fast going the way of all good timber.

People also said there would not be any market for the timber if it was taken and a great many refused to take claims and a great many more forfeited their rights after filing, having become discouraged at the outlook for a market.

During the past two weeks a number of our local people who were located by Dorgan & Co. have sold their claims. Although the price paid is not a fancy one, it goes a long way towards showing that the market will become better, and a larger portion of people having claims in that country are holding for their price and they are wise in doing so.

A Fatal Accident.

Edward Bland was instantly killed last Thursday evening by a log rolling over him.

At the time of the accident Ed and his brother, Robert were logging at the Dee saw mill near the head of Willow creek, hauling logs for the Compton & McMeekin mill. While loading a 24 inch log from the lower side of the wagon, it became necessary to block the log on skids and take another hitch. They were using a double or forked chain. Robert was handling the chain and Ed was attending the log. As Robert turned the team he saw the log start down the skids and Ed caught in the forks of the chain and hurred over the wagon and log, the latter rolling over him. His neck was broken, the upper part of his head mashed in and one leg was dislocated. Death was instantaneous.

He was 26 years of age and leaves a wife and three small children, a father, mother five brothers and one sister. His mother was prostrated by the shock of his death and Dr. A. D. Morrison was called to see her. She is much better at present but for a time it was feared the shock would result fatal on the account of her age and the fact that she was in poor health.

The relatives feel very grateful for the kindness and aid of the many friends who assisted them in their time of sorrow. The funeral service was held at Willow creek school house by Rev. Clark, Saturday, July 25th at 9 a. m. Interment was had in the Gray Butte Cemetery.
