The Portage Railway A "Dead Duck."

Through Chief Engineer A. E. Hammond of the Columbia Southern railway and engineer in charge of the state's preliminary work on the portage railway project, we learn that all hopes of completing the enterprise with the money available, is gone. Mr. Hammond was in the city Tuesday, and says that the O. R. & N. Company asks \$100,000 for the rock piles and sand duns over which the state would have to build. This would leave only \$65,000 available for construction work, and as the sum asked for in the first place was barely sufficient to cover the cost of construction, and equipment, work cannot go ahead until another legislature has met and taken further action. It seems that the plan of condemning the railroad lands has been abandoned.

Thus it is that a measure, framed with the people's interests in mind has been frustrated, perhaps forever, and thus it is that the "poor taxpayer's" interests are lowned by a grasping corporation. In the opinion of the Journal the portage project, thus blocked, will never again be resurrected, for by the time another legislature meets, some other project will be in mind, or perhaps the government locks will then be in the course of construction.

Equalization Board.

There will be held a meeting of the Board of Equalization for Crook county, at the county clerk's office on Monday, August 31st, for the purpose of publicly examining the assessment rolls, and correcting all errors in valuation, description or quality of lands, lots, or other property, and it shall be the duty of persons interested to appear at the time and place appointed. And if it shall appear to such board of equalization that there are any lands, lots, or other property assessed twice or in the name of a person or person not the owner thereof, or assessed under or beyond its actual value, or any lands, lots or property not assessed, said board shall make proper corrections.—B. F. Jones, Assessor.

The following is the state law bearing on this matter: "A person who fails to appear before a county board of equalization, as here provided, cannot maintain a suit in equity to enjoin the collection of any portion of the tax resulting from a wrongful assessment by the assessor. But if he has so appeared, and failed to find redress, and he has an equity in his favor, he may enjoin the collection of an illegal tax."—State Law.
