A Good Attainable Yield.
S. J. Newsome, accompanied by Johnny and Gale were in the city Saturday. Mr. Newsome reports an exceptional yield on his 22-acre tract of alfalfa, situated below town on Crooked river, cutting on an average in two crops six and one half tons of hay per acre. The last crop which matured in 38 days, was 28 inches in height, which is a growth of just an inch for every 24 hours of the time. We doubt if there is any other section in Oregon that can boast of as good a record, and still there is any amount of unused lands in our county that will do as well. They simply need the irrigation and right attention given Mr. Newsome's alfalfa to make them equally as productive.

New Dixie Stamp-Mill.
Nelson Moore, of Pittsburg, part owner of the Dixie group, arrived in the city Sunday, and in company with Frank Ray, manager and also part owner, left at once for the property. The Kincaid mill mentioned in a former issue has been purchased in San Francisco and will be shipped at an early date. The plant will be provided with one Woolbury concentrator, and will handle twenty tons of ore a day.

The sawmill recently installed on the property will be ready to run as soon as the boiler arrives. It is expected today or tomorrow. The sawmill will be started up as soon as possible to cut lumber for the concentrating plant.—Sumpter Miner.
