WANTED—A STATEMENT.

In a recent issue of the Portland Oregonian there was published an itemized statement of the receipts and disbursements of the Hepner Relief Committee, in which it was shown that Portland's contribution to the Hepner relief fund was \$2500.00, while many individual and community contributions were not mentioned. This is a source of considerable surprise to the citizens of Prineville, and presumably to many other sections of the state. This city contributed over \$500.00 to the Hepner relief fund, to be expended through the Portland committee, and doubtless many other communities contributed a sufficient amount to far exceed the whole sum sent by Portland.

Now what the people of the Northwest want is an itemized statement of the receipts and disbursements of the Portland committee. If the fund sent by the citizens of Prineville has not been appropriated to the use intended, viz: the relief of the Hepner sufferers, we want it back, as it will be a nucleus for a local relief fund of our own. Portland has no right to misappropriate the funds sent for this special purpose, and if more funds were sent than were needed, do as the people of Hepner did, and return them to the contributors. Let the Portland Relief Committee publish a statement, and if the funds contributed

by our people have not been expended we can use them to good advantage in helping fill the gap caused by the small pox epidemic last spring.
