A. R. Eastwood, who has been running the Dee saw mill on Willow Creek during the past season was in the city Tuesday. He stated that the mill cut over 1,100,000 feet this year, 900,000 of which have been disposed.

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## New Minister Takes Up Work Here in Presbyterian Pastorate.

Rev. Z. W. Commerford, the new pastor of the Presbyterian church, arrived in the city last Thursday morning, and was greeted at the church on Sunday with good-sized congregations. He preached in the morning from Heb. 10:9 on the "Altitude of Christ Toward the Father," indicating that as disciples of Christ our business also should be to do the will of God. In the evening the text was from Phil. 2:15 and the object, "Christian Shining." The pastor emphasized the following thoughts on Christian influence: first, the impossibility of not having an influence—no one shuns whether we will or not; second, since we do shine, we are to shine "as lights, modestly and constantly; third, we are to shine in the dark place—the world—where we are needed."

The new minister comes to the state of Oregon from the synod of Wisconsin, where he has labored since graduating from the McCormick Theological Seminary in 1901. He is also a graduate of the Hamilton College at Clinton, N. Y., class of '98, and begins his work in Prineville under favorable circumstances.

The plans are in progress for a beautiful new church for the pastor's people which will cost over \$3000. It is to be located just east of the public school building, and if circumstances permit, work will begin this fall. With the impetus and enthusiasm the new pastor brings to the work, the prospects for the church are bright.
