County Court Proceeding.

In the matter of the Cotter road. Report read for the first time and upon the second reading was referred to the district attorney. Clerk ordered to prevent both bills for the surveying of said road twice.

In the matter of the D. W. Booth road. Surveyors report by G. S. Springer and J. W. Elliott. Report read for first and second times and referred to district attorney.

In the matter of a petition for a saloon license at Deschutes by James W. Shaw and George Reuterhouse. Passed for amendment of the bonds. Upon the applicant filing a bond to be approved by the county judge, the court ordered that the clerk issue a license for six months.

In the matter of a petition for a saloon license by Severn Derbing. Petition read and bond approved and license ordered issued.

In the matter of a petition for a saloon license at Lytle by Rene West and Charles Brock. Passed for amendment of the bond. Clerk ordered to issue the license upon the filing of a bond to be approved by the county judge.

In the matter of a liquor petition by Benton and Grater. Petition granted, bond filed and approved and clerk ordered to issue a license for six months.

In the matter of a petition for a liquor license by George Stevens at Sisters. Petition granted, bond filed and approved and license ordered to be issued by the clerk.

In the matter of warrant No. 445 in favor of Will Wurzeiler for Crook County Stock show for 1903. Warrant ordered canceled as no fair was held.

Petition for a bridge across the Deschutes river at the Agency by T. B. Tucker et al. Clerk ordered to make application to the Indian department for landing on the west side of the Agency and to send to Mr. Kirk, the agent at Warm Springs, a bill that it will take 100,000 feet of lumber to build the bridge. Court was informed that the cost of trams for the bridge would not exceed \$200, and that the cost of building the structure would not exceed \$1000 outside of abutments.

In the matter of incendiary fires. It is ordered that Crook county pay the sum of \$500 as a reward for the arrest and conviction of any one setting out any incendiary fires, burning hay, grain in the stack or granary, dwellings, fences, or any other buildings. From the 1st day of July, 1903, and until this order is revoked by the county court.

In the matter of the application of Martha Morris for county a'd. Ordered that the clerk draw a warrant in favor of petitioner for \$50.

In the matter of delinquent taxes. Sheriff was ordered to collect and unpaid taxes by levy and sale by January 1st 1904.

In the matter of clearing the court house and providing wood for the building. Matter was left in the hands of the court judge.

The assessor's roll for the year 1903 was examined and accepted.
