**THE COLUMBIA SOUTHERN EXTENSION.**

The transfer of the Columbia Southern railroad to the Harriman interests may or may not be a significant move so far as Central Oregon and its immediate communication with outside points with its consequent internal development is concerned. That the road will be extended as far as Heisler station in order to come in touch with the wheat belt of the Agency Plains is an assertion that bears the ear marks of feasibility and reasonableness, and it is an assumption borne out by the fact that another transportation company with its objective district 75 miles to the southward, has made its terminal station at the point mentioned.

With the wheat belt in north eastern Crook county tapped, there remains but little else at this time along the line of the proposed extension which would warrant a further expenditure in reaching a point lying a greater distance to the south. The timber along the Deschutes, which in a short time will be the great drawing card for transportation facilities, would not in its present state prove a cynosure for the expenditure of millions involved in the laying of steel rails. And again, that timber must eventually move to the east instead of going over a north and south line.

Mr. Harriman himself has stated that the great trade of Central Oregon in the irrigation and timber regions must be reached through the Willamette valley, the most feasible route being across the Cascades from the terminal station of the Corvallis & Eastern. With the control of the latter in his hands and the ownership of the Columbia Southern acquired, it is highly probable that he will reverse his opinion as positively expressed and extend the line.

So Central Oregon must needs look to the mountains on the west for the road which will relieve the present vacancy in matters pertaining to transportation, and

which will ultimately give the room for her to swing the hammer and proclaim to the world the fact that within her borders lies an empire filled full of wealth and diverse quantities of productiveness.

**REPUBLICAN LANDSLIDE**

Dispatches received yesterday indicate an unprecedented Republican victory. Roosevelt has swept the country from one end to the other and the New York World concedes his vote in the electoral college to be 325.

Connecticut went Republican by a majority of 25,000. Indiana was carried by a large vote, Roosevelt gaining a big lead in that state and in the city of Indianapolis over McKinley's vote in 1900.

Parker carried New York City by a majority estimated yesterday at 50,000, but the country gave Roosevelt an overwhelming vote putting his majority over 100,000 for the state. All through the north the landslide has been complete, the doubtful states having fallen into the Republican camp.

Chairman Baker of the State Central Committee yesterday sent a dispatch to the effect that Oregon would roll up a majority of 40,000 for Roosevelt. From the returns coming in from the local precincts there seems to be no question but that Roosevelt will carry Crook county by 500. The vote in the Prineville Precinct was as follows: Republican 180; Democratic 94.

But few returns from other precincts in the county had come in up to the hour of going to press. The vote at Bend showed a Republican majority of nearly 100, and Ketchikan precinct also polled a vote of over 100 in favor of the Republican candidate. Republican majorities were also recorded in McKay and Montgomery precincts.

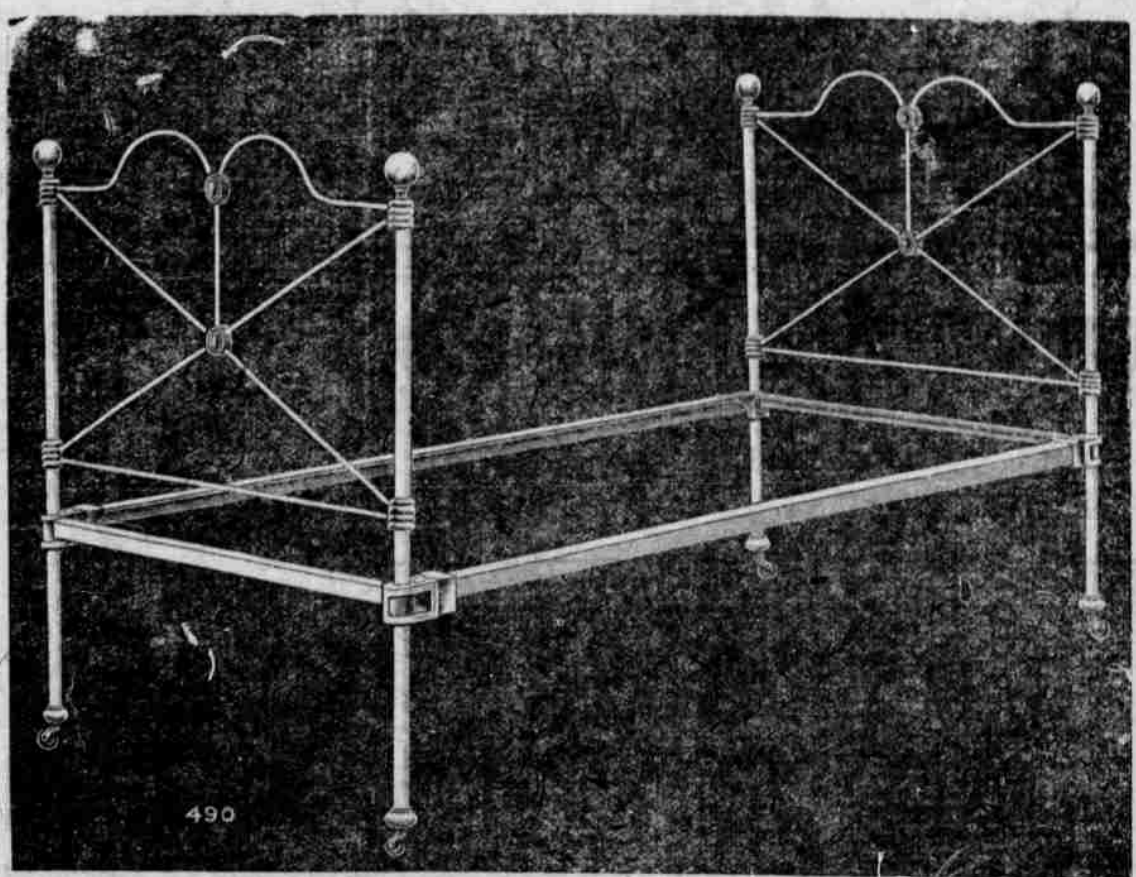
