The Central Oregon Transportation Company last week filed a suit before the Circuit court at The Dalles against Morrow & Keenan of Willow creek to enjoin the firm from interfering with the roads right of way, where it crosses the stock firm's land about two miles east of Madras.

As an evidence of the eagerness with which building material is sought at points along the Deschutes Valley, the lumber firm of Hightower & Smith, who have a saw mill in the Tumalo basin, shut down on filling orders for a week in order to saw out enough lumber with which to complete their plant.

An application, signed by 49 voters of Bend, is to be presented to the county court the last of the month, praying that the territory described shall be ordered incorporated. The future city of Bend will include the old town site of Bend and if the petition is granted a mayor, six aldermen, a recorder, a marshal and a treasurer will be elected.

The last event was enjoyed greatly by those in attendance and Mr. Tejada promises a second dance with still more entertaining numbers arranged on the programme for the evening in question. Harry Smith came over from the Tumalo basin last week where he has been employed during the summer with the Columbia Southern Irrigation company. Work there has closed for the year and canal lines traverse the district in every direction. Many settlers have taken up tracts and large bodies of land are being plowed and put in readiness for raising crops next year. Next year the main ditch will be extended considerably farther and the work of reclaiming the segregation, so far as the company is concerned, continued until fall.

Hiring another wagon and driver in the vicinity Mr. Morgan and his wife were driven back to Vale then to Ontario where three physicians operated on the injured man. He was under the influence of chloroform for over four hours while his jaw was being set and holes drilled in his chin and wires run through them and around his teeth to hold the joints firm. At present the unfortunate man is compelled to take soft foods and nourishment through a rubber tube. Mr. and Mrs. Morgan will remain in Vale, where they are at present, until about the middle of the month when it is thought the former will be well enough to be moved to his home in the eastern part of this county.

With the baseball season closed and the fans and players given an opportunity to air themselves there is forming a proposition to secure grounds for next year. These could be secured, it is thought, back of the Athletic building and could be fenced and a grand stand built at a very nominal expense. Then the receipts from the games next season would do away with the necessity of raising a purse for each contest. Several of the business men in the city have expressed a willingness to take stock in case the idea reaches a point of organization.

A thousand head of beef cattle were driven to Pendleton last Monday from points in Grant county for shipment to the Frey-Brun company of Seattle. Five hundred of the number were purchased from Joseph Combs of John Day and 500 head of Smith Bros. of Susanville. The stock was purchased by J. C. Longan and completed the last heavy buy that Mr. Longan will make in that section this year. The cattle were said to be in fine condition for slaughtering. The steers brought \$2.75 per hundred and good beef cattle sold for prices ranging from \$2 to \$2.10.

Instructor Shockley, of the P. A. A. C., has arranged the evenings on which he will give instructions in gymnastic exercises. Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday evenings will be the men's nights; Tuesday and Friday afternoons, the ladies' days, and Saturday afternoon for the young ladies. During the evenings and afternoons mentioned lessons in calisthenics, dumb-bell, Indian clubs and wand exercises will be given. Other evenings during the week Mr. Shockley will give instructions in wrestling and boxing and along other lines of gymnastic exercise. There is no charge attached and the classes should be large and probably will be as many of the members have been indisposed toward gymnasium work so long as a competent instructor was present to take charge.

### County Court Proceedings.

Ordered that warrant be drawn for \$500 on road fund in favor of P. Chittwood, supervisor of road District No. 9, to fix roads. To have use of grader and also the road plow belonging to the Ashwood district.

Report of C. B. Allen, road supervisor, allowed and clerk ordered to draw warrant in favor of C. B. Allen in the sum of \$75, and also to allow use of road grader.

Matter of the application of George Summers to erect telephone poles along certain roads, application granted and poles to be placed on either edge of survey of the roads mentioned.

Report of C. C. Hon, road supervisor, report approved and ordered that supervisor use the \$61.50 on hand and present bills for balance to \$100.

Report of G. H. Nye, road supervisor, approved and clerk ordered to notify supervisor to fix road.

Report of P. T. Monroe, supervisor District No. 19, approved, and warrant on road fund in favor of P. T. Monroe for \$122 to cover amount due as per report, and warrant for \$78 ordered on road fund to cover further cost of work.

J. W. Whit, road supervisor district No. 5, clerk ordered to notify J. W. Whit to specify where lumber is to be used and also report the use of \$150 appropriated to his district this spring.

Report of W. E. Ducheln, road supervisor Dist. No. 10, warrant ordered drawn for \$100 on road fund in favor of W. E. Ducheln to fix roads including bridges.

Report of Wm. Wigle on road work, warrant ordered drawn in favor of Wm. Wigle on road fund for \$245.35 to cover all bills and expenses reported.

Petition of A. B. Estebenet for change of saloon license, petition not granted as the law does not allow a transfer.

Report of Henry Cram, road supervisor, warrant ordered drawn on road fund in favor of Henry S. Cram for \$200 for road work to be done as per report.

In the matter of the road fund City of Prineville, decision of Frank Meneffe, Dist. Atty., placed on journal.

High school building accepted except that C. A. Gray agrees to complete black board immediately including molding on boards. Clerk ordered to draw warrants on High school fund in favor of C. A. Gray as follows: One for \$3000; one for \$2000 and one \$1500, making a total sum of \$6500, and each of said warrants to bear on face thereof the following: "Issued and payable according to contract between Crook county and Burrough and Fraser. Dated Sep. 1904."

Petition for local option liquor election, the facts and findings of the county clerk approved.

Ordered that Frank Elkins secure and proceed to drive piles for bridges over the county and build bridges. Man, 4 horses and wagon, \$8 per day while at work. Frank Elkins \$3.50 per day while at work, other men not to exceed \$2.25 per day. Warrant ordered drawn in favor of Frank Elkins for \$150 general fund for work.

Ordered that C. L. Roberts proceed and make dam to turn Crooked river into old channel at P. B. Davis ranch, place and also fix bridge. Clerk to notify Roberts.

In the matter of the bridge across Crooked river at the Forest ranch, J. B. Tillotson agrees to give bond for 12 years guaranteeing metal and workmanship of wood work and county against damages from injuries to anyone. Clerk ordered to draw warrant in favor of J. B. Tillotson for \$3000 on general fund, balance of \$580 is waived as per agreement if bond is not filed by Nov. 3, 1904. Agreement filed.

Clerk ordered to advertise that court will receive applications for appointment of county physician. Applications to state prices for attending county charges. Applications to be assessed on at 10 o'clock Nov. 26, 1904.

It appearing to the court that by the certificate of the superintendent of the state insane asylum that Squire F. Irwin, committed from this county September 21, 1904, was discharged Oct. 12, 1904, as cured, clerk ordered to make necessary entry on the journal.

Clerk ordered to make necessary journal entry that Marion Smeltzer, an insane person, committed from this county July 4, 1904, died Oct. 1904, as per certificate from the superintendent of the state insane asylum.

Warrant ordered drawn on general fund in favor of Hahn & Fried for \$200 for wrongful assessment for the year 1903.

Matter of E. A. Friday wrongful assessment, claim disallowed as it is swearing off valuation and not property wrongfully assessed.

Report of Randolph Wilson, road supervisor, approved with exceptions noted.

Petition for saloon license of Fred A. Shonquest & Co., petition granted upon filing bond and receipt for \$200 license for one year.

J. B. Palmer was appointed constable of Black Butte precinct to file bond and oath of office.

W. H. Staats was appointed road supervisor of Bend precinct. Clerk to send bond and oath of office.

Thos. N. Balfour appointed Justice of the Peace for Hardin precinct. File bond and oath of office.

C. H. Foster appointed Justice of Peace of Black Butte precinct. File bond and oath of office.

In the matter of filing the semi-annual reports the clerk to make necessary entries in records.

Application of J. B. Tillotson for amount withheld on contract for bridge across Crooked river at and near Prineville, Oregon, motion disallowed. J. B. Tillotson heretofore Sept. 7, 1904 in open court stated and said in reference to said matter when up for payment and refused by the court that he would not make any further demands and would not sue the county for the money so withheld as damages in construction of said bridge.

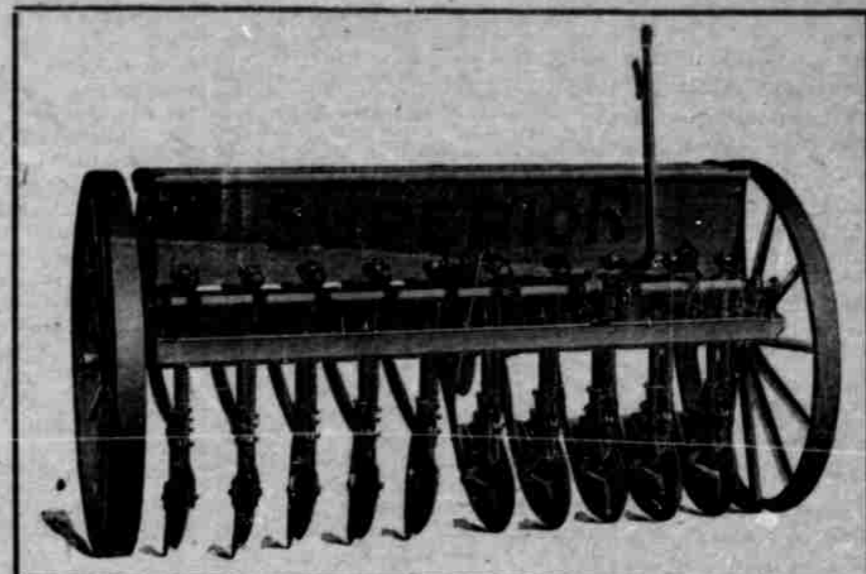
