Warren Glaze is making arrangements to give another musical entertainment on Friday evening, January 6. He will be assisted by the members of his musical classes and some of the best local talent. The entertainment in general will be similar to the very successful one which Mr. Glaze gave nearly a year ago and the proceeds will be used in completing the fencing ground for the cemetery. A portion of the funds raised at the last entertainment are still on hand and these will be increased by the amount raised in January. The program will be given in Athletic hall, the numbers to be announced later. The Finance committee in charge of the work for which the entertainment is to be given is composed of Arthur Hodges, Wm. Draper and M. D. Powell.

At a meeting of the school board, held last Saturday, it was decided to build two additional rooms onto the south side of the public school, building in order to accommodate the increasing number of pupils. A three mill tax for general school purposes and a three and a half mill tax to partially cover the cost of the new addition to the public school building were voted upon and passed. Acting chairman M. E. Brink furnished a statement from the tax rolls showing that the amount of property in the district subject to the levy amounted to \$334,000, and that the three and a half mill tax for the addition would not quite pay for the work. Bids for the construction of the new rooms will be asked for as soon as the plans and specifications are prepared. The expenses in educational matters have been considerably heavier this year, owing in part to the fact that an extra teacher has been employed, which necessitated the three mill levy for general purposes.

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Centennial Notes.

Electrical experts are at work upon an extremely novel feature for the opening exercises of the Lewis and Clark Centennial Exposition on June 1 next. The scheme is to have President Roosevelt, at Washington, touch a few keys and set in motion the chimneys in the towers of the Government Building at the Exposition. The chimneys, 250 feet above the water will play "My Country 'Tis of Thee." The sound will carry a great distance owing to the fact that the Government Building is located on a peninsula in Gull's Lake, half a mile from the mainland. Arrangements have already been made to have President Roosevelt touch a button that will set in motion the machinery for the Western World's Fair, and it is thought there will be no difficulty in arranging for the additional feature of the chimneys.

Three water towers, each sixty feet high, will supply water for emergency use at the Lewis and Clark Centennial. The towers will be covered with vines which will completely conceal the woodwork.

In the experimental gardens, located in the western part of the Lewis and Clark Exposition grounds, all manner of Western products will be exhibited as they actually grow. This is a new feature in expositions.

The bronze statue of Sacajawea, the Indian heroine, will be located in the center of Columbia Court, the central plaza of the Exposition. The statue will face the west.

The Bridge of Nations, which connects the Government Peninsula and the mainland is more than two thousand feet long.

Superintendent Dinwiddie calls the attention of the pupils of the public schools to the following announcement of several prizes which are offered for essays, by the Oregon Society of the Sons of the American Revolution. The organization is composed of descendants of those who assisted in establishing American independence and any male descendant of such ancestor is eligible. One of its objects is to stimulate interest in the history of the American Revolution and loyalty to its principles. For this purpose the society offers three prizes of \$25, \$15 and \$10 respectively for the best essay written by any student under twenty-one years of age, in any public school in Oregon, on either of the following two Revolutionary subjects:

1. The Quebec campaign. 2. The co-operation of the French, how brought about and the results.

Essays are limited in length to 2500 words, must be written on legal cap on one side of the paper in the student's own handwriting and must be accompanied by the certificate of principal of the school attended by the author, to the effect that the author is a bona fide student in the school and has been in attendance there in not less than six weeks during the school year of 1904-05. Essays must be forwarded to the chairman of the committee in charge, General M. Anderson, 251 North Twenty-fourth street, Portland, so as to reach him no later than February 1, 1905. In awarding the prizes the committee will be governed by these three considerations: 1. Historical accuracy. 2. Orthography, grammar, syntax and punctuation.

Any additional information relative to the competition which may be desired will be cheerfully furnished by the chairman of the committee. The essay which is awarded first prize will be published in full, with the name of the author, in the public press.
