John Atkinson was appointed justice of the peace of Ireland precinct. Clerk to send bond and oath of office.

Petition of E. A. Bussett et al for county road. Road declared county road upon applicant paying expenses incurred by county.

Report and bill of H. Grimes, supervisor, ordered that clerk notify H. Grimes to file an itemized statement as to where work was done, parties working and amount paid per day on his bill for \$110.

Rebate on taxes of E. Johnson. Warrant ordered drawn favor of E. Johnson for \$7.81 rebate on tax receipt No. 1525 for year 1903 being less city and Dist. tax.

In the matter of road poll tax, Sec. 29, Page 275, session laws 1903. Clerk to issue to road supervisors cash receipts only for poll tax as per law felt.

Thos. Alderlyce, of Culver, Oregon, appointed road supervisor of Haystack Dist. No. 6.

Clerk ordered to notify C. Everingham as to whether he will accept the road supervisorship of Ireland Dist. No. 2.

Clarence Calbraith appointed road supervisor McKay Dist. No. 7.

K. D. Huston appointed road supervisor Ashwood Dist. No. 11.

In the matter of an educational exhibit at Lewis & Clark Fair. Ordered that a warrant be drawn in favor of C. B. Dinwiddie, general fund, for \$100 for educational exhibit at the fair and file statement of the disposition of same.

Request of J. J. Smith for deputy, salary to be paid by the county. In consideration of county paying for one deputy, clerk agrees to furnish one deputy at his expense and deputy paid for by county shall devote time entirely to work of recording instruments and writing up probate and commissioners journals, and so long as Ethel Liggett acts as deputy she shall do the said work and receive the pay of deputy by county of \$2 per day or 25 cents per hour. And clerk agrees to cut out all outside work. Said pay by county to continue at discretion of court.

Geo. Dillon, of Madras appointed road supervisor Kitcher Dist. No. 23.

In the matter of road supervisors, clerk to forward maps of road and voting districts to each road supervisor.

D. S. Hamilton appointed justice of the peace of Ashwood Dist. No. 11.

Report of J. L. Dunlap on books of county for 8 years prior to July 5, 1904. Report accepted and experts discharged and clerk ordered to notify delinquent officers, or in case of death of any delinquent officer, then bondsmen of such officer, of such shortage mentioned in said report, and that such matter will be heard by the county court May 3, 1905, and requests said officers to be present.

In the matter of a new grade west of Prineville and on south side of hill leading to top of rim rock. T. H. Lafollett and Will Wurzweller in open court agree to build new grade on south side of hill leading to top of rim rock, on not to exceed seven and a half per cent and full 16 feet wide entire distance and place in suitable culverts for draining said grade, and secure right of way for said county for said grade, and upon completion of said grade to satisfaction of the court the county will pay them therefor the sum of \$1500. The said Lafollett and Wurzweller to stand all expense, overhauling and building said grade and securing right of way and fencing and county to be under no obligation on account thereof until completed and accepted by the court and then only in said sum of \$1500.

In the matter of the Nissen road. Clerk ordered to notify the road supervisors of Kitcher and Willow Creek Districts of order heretofore made to open Nissen road.

In the matter of the incorporating expenses of the city of Bend. Clerk ordered to make out bill and forward to city of Bend the amount that county has paid out on the incorporation of city of Bend and holding election and request payment.
