Telephone Line to Culver. Postmaster Summers returned Monday evening from the Culver district where he has completed the Prineville-Culver telephone line as far as the J. H. Windom ranch. The line will be built on into Culver as soon as the balance of the wire is received and put on the ground. It is expected that connection will be made between the two points inside of a couple of weeks.

In the meantime work on the Pacific States telephone line from Madras to Culver is progressing rapidly and in all probability will be completed as soon as the line between the latter place and this city. By the second week next month communication can be had with Madras and all way points. The wire is strung to a point only 9 miles this side of Madras and the line would have been completed to the latter point this week but a mistake was made at Shaniko and the wire and insulators held there through an error. The delay forced Mr. Summers to disband the working crew for a short time. He states, however, that the line will be pushed on to Madras as soon as possible and connection between the latter place and Prineville will be established inside of the next ten days. Yesterday morning the line was open to the Windom ranch and operated very satisfactorily.
