Locals Lose Five Inning Game.

A misplaced railroad, left over from last season, a flurry of snow, accompanied by a 45 mile an hour gale that blew down clouds of dust from Wasco county for an hour before it finally brought down the moisture, put a short stop to the ball game between Prineville and Bend last Sunday just as the fifth inning was closed and at the time the spectators were expecting to see a closely contested finish. The score stood 4 to 2 in favor of Bend giving the latter team the first game against the locals in two years.

Biddle scored the first run for Bend in the first inning. Another one came in the third and home plate was crossed twice in the fourth. The fifth inning was brought to a speedy termination by a phenomenal one handed catch by Rosenberg which cut off a clean hit. Blyen drove a hit straight ball which under ordinary circumstances would have been put down as a Texas leaguer in right field and good for one base, but the liner never got past second base. Rosenberg jumped in the air, put up his left mitt and the ball stuck—for a few seconds, then dropped into his right hand. Returning the ball to first base, he retired Biddle and completed a double play.

The Locals scored their two runs in the close of the first inning after two outs had been made. Wieser's wild throw to third allowing Bowen and Barnes to cross the plate. After that men died on bases while Blyen made his reputation good by strike outs. The score by innings was as follows:

Change in D. I. & P. Co's Officers.

Directors of the Deschutes Irrigation & Power Company held a meeting yesterday in the offices of the corporation in this city, at which resignations of R. F. Guerin, Jr., secretary-treasurer, and of W. E. Guerin, of Bend, members of the board of directors, were received, and Fred S. Stanley elected to the positions. Fred S. Stanley is a well-known capitalist, of the firm of Stanley & Smith, who will immediately enter upon the duties of his positions with the company, in which he is a heavy investor.

Extensive plans are being out-lined for encouraging immigration and settlement of the 140,000 acres of land over which canals are either completed or being carried from the Deschutes River. Beginning within a few days the automobile line of the Central Oregon Transportation Company will be started to afford rapid transit between the present terminus of the Columbia Southern Railroad and the lands near Bend, Oregon.
