Wigle and Parker have sold one of their ranches on Crooked river, 16 miles above the city, to M. S. Mayfield of Rosland. The tract is composed of 320 acres and will be converted into an alfalfa ranch. The consideration was \$4000. Mr. Mayfield will move his family to the property soon and will winter most of his cattle there which are now ranging in the vicinity of his ranch on the Deschutes.

The lumber for the new grand stand at the ball diamond is on the grounds and the structure will be completed in time for next Sunday's game. The stand will have five tiers of seats and will accommodate about 400 persons. It will be cup shaped running from a point between home and first base around to a point near third and will be 160 feet in length. Nearly 8000 feet of lumber will be used in the construction work. J. B. Shipp has the contract.

A man and his three sons, who were immigrating to southern Oregon, stopped in town a couple of days this week to rest after their trip across the Cascades. They had with them an Irish setter dog which, hitched to a small cart, had hauled their cooking utensils and provisions all the way from the valley. The animal acted as well in a harness as the best broken horse and obeyed commands as well as if reins and whip had been used to guide him.

The base ball game between Bend and Prineville scheduled for next Sunday, May 7, promises to be the best game yet played between these two teams as both nines are putting in some good hard practice work. The new diamond will be ready for the game and a grand stand erected with a seating capacity of 400 which will add to the comfort of the spectators. An admission charge of 25 cents will be made to the grounds.

Fred Scott, a brother-in-law of Henry Cadle, was killed by a miner at Seneca, California, last week. Mr. Cadle received but few particulars concerning the tragedy. Mr. Scott was the owner of a mine in that vicinity and had in his employ a large number of miners.
