Supervisor's report of Henry Grimes. Report does not state where work was done.

Report of David Weaver, supervisor of road district No. 4. Report to be corrected.

Statement for comparison by John B. Shipp on expert's report. Explanation satisfactory and accepted.

In the matter of expert's report. C. Sam Smith owes \$161.07 as per his report filed and \$189.91 turned over by W. C. Congleton, total due being \$350.98 up to July 5, 1904, as per reports filed. Clerk to notify C. Sam Smith to pay same by June 5, 1905 and credit the partial payments so made on roll of 1899 for said amount of \$189.91.

In the matter of the new grade up the rim road west of Prineville, now at this time deeds from the Willamette Valley and Cascade Mountain Wagon Road or Charles Alchid and Samuel Dingey to right of way on new grade having been presented and it appearing that said grade has been completed in all respects and accepted as per agreement herein, March 8, 1905, it is ordered that a warrant on road fund in favor of Lafollett and Wurzweller for \$1500 be drawn in full payment.
