His clip of wool averaged 9 pounds to the fleece which he sold at 20 cents. Mr. Roberts said the Alkali district was in good condition owing to the recent heavy rains, and prospects fine for a good season's crop.

Sheriff Smith yesterday received word from W. E. Guerin, Jr., who is now in New York City, that he had interested eastern capitalists in the McKay irrigation project north of this city. The necessary funds to finance the scheme have been assured, and Mr. Guerin will leave for Prineville with two of the new men interested in the enterprise the last of the week. The party will look over the scope of country to be reclaimed, and Mr. Guerin writes that all he wants is to get them on the ground. He expresses himself as feeling confident that they will be satisfied beyond a doubt.

A Home Missionary Society was organized by the ladies of the Presbyterian church last Sunday evening under the direction of Miss Julia Hatch, the missionary from Siam, who spoke at the Union Church in the morning and evening. A cloudburst in the plateau region above Antelope Tuesday afternoon gave the residents in that vicinity cause for alarm. Water several feet deep rushed down the main thoroughfare to the creek bottoms and everything lying loose on the ground was carried along in the swift current. Aside from nominal damage to some of the fields and growing crops no other losses were reported. The telephone line between Antelope and Prineville was torn down by the storm and communication was not re-established until late yesterday afternoon.

**Thousands of Sheep Go to East.**

"What promises to be the biggest Spring movement of sheep to the East in the history of the stock business in the state is now commencing in Eastern Oregon," said G. J. Mills, livestock agent of the O. R. & N. "Probably 350,000 sheep or better will be sent away from the Oregon ranges."

Most of the sheep will be distributed over the ranges of Montana, Wyoming and Colorado, where they will be fed during the Summer and later taken to the feeding lots where they will be fattened on grain and then slaughtered. Feeding places near Omaha, Chicago, St. Paul, Kansas City and St. Louis will prepare the sheep for market at the approach of Winter, when they will be fit for mutton.

Demand is good in the East for sheep, and, in fact, Oregon mutton always commands a ready sale. Prices are high, owing to the good demand, and wool prices are also soaring. Oregon ranges are becoming stocked to the limit, and the surplus of the flocks must be disposed of. Movement of Oregon cattle to the East also promises to be heavy this Spring.—Telegram.
