The members of the railroad party have come and gone. The country generally feels a trifle rejuvenated owing to their imposing presence. It is quite possible the prospects for railroad extension are not as remote as before they came, but nevertheless still remain in the future, which always cares for itself. As Mr. Cotton stated while here the reports and recommendations made by the visiting party will be forwarded very soon to the head offices, some to Mr. Stubbs, of the traffic department in Chicago, and some to other officials in New York City. In time these various officials will get together. Then there will be general discussions and a harmonizing of the reports as a whole and a decision as to what course shall be pursued. If favorable to this county then preparations will be made to lay the rails. But they aren't going to twist their necks off in their eagerness to consummate the work. Mr. Cotton didn't say that in so many words, but he inferred as much. Well, then, after a bit, when all the pros and cons have been turned over and viewed from both top and bottom, Crook county will know its fate, so far as the Columbia Southern is concerned. But there will be no railroad building this year from that direction. Maybe next. Big bodies move slowly, and Columbia Southern still slower.

Death of Mrs. Eliza Hamilton.

Mrs. Eliza Hamilton, one of the pioneer settlers of the state and among the first to settle in this county, died at her home in this city last Sunday morning at the age of 89 years. She became a resident of Crook county in 1876 and has been living in Prineville for many years past.

Eliza Jane Gholson was born in Missouri May 24, 1836. At the age of 17 she came to Oregon with her parents and a party of emigrants who settled at Bethel in Yamhill county. The year following she was united in marriage to W. C. Hamilton and continued to reside in the Willamette Valley until '76 when she and her husband settled here.

She is survived by five children: Mrs. C. F. Barnes, of this city; Mrs. J. M. Street, of Fife; Mrs. J. M. Mitchell, of Elhot, B. C.; Mrs. E. E. Crossen, of Curlew, Wash., and J. M. Hamilton, of Antelope. Her husband died in this city five years ago.

Deceased had been a member of the Christian church for a number of years. The funeral services were conducted Tuesday afternoon at the residence by the Rev. W. P. Jinnett,

pastor of the Methodist church. Interment took place at the Union cemetery.

L. M. Millis is down from his ranch at Suplee.

B. F. Jones returned the last of the week from a business trip to Silver Lake.

Dr. Gesner left yesterday morning for Portland to be in attendance at the land trials.

James Wright, of Summit Prairie, was in the city on a business trip during the first of the week.

Stroud and Roller are making arrangements to erect a merry-go-round for the Fourth of July celebration.

Love Bailey, of Paulina, was in the city on a business trip during the past week. Mr. Bailey stated that numerous sales of cattle had been made in the Paulina district during the past few weeks. He disposed of 150 head of 2-year olds and yearlings to Gerber Bros., of Klamath Falls, receiving \$22 for the former and \$16 for the latter. The cattle will be delivered this fall at Silver Lake. E. E. Laughlin also sold about 200 head to the same firm, receiving \$28 per head for 4-year olds which were in the bunch. W. C. Congleton and Fred Powell made sales of two bunches, the former to Burgess and the latter to McGill.

Thos. Arnold, of Sisters, has demonstrated that straw berries can be grown as successfully in Crook county, under proper management, as elsewhere in the country. Yesterday he brought over a quart can of the berries which he raised this year on his ranch at the foot of the mountains and both the size and flavor were equal to the Hood River berries which have been shipped in here this

year. Mr. Arnold had a half acre in crop. A late frost killed the first crop from the vines and the berries brought over yesterday were from the second picking, which speaks doubly well for the success of his experiment. Next year he intends to protect the vines better and will secure from the half acre what he should have had this season, in the neighborhood of four or five hundred gallons.

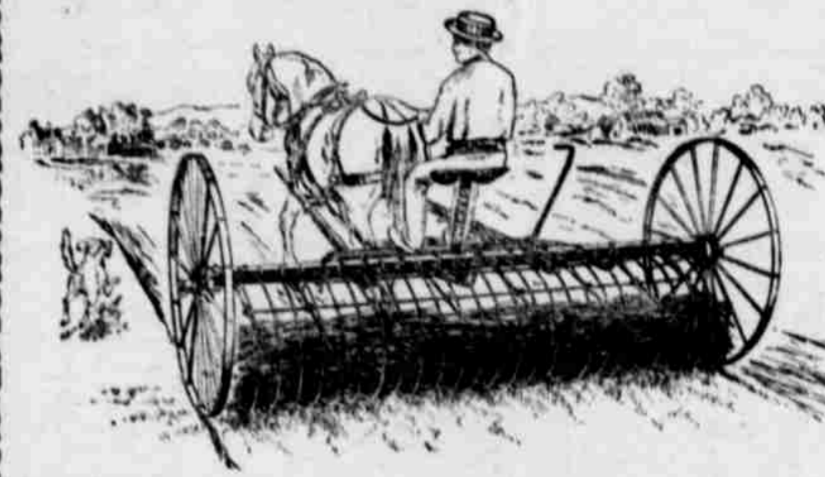
Fourth of July CELEBRATION
