Candidates for a given nomination will have their names placed on the primary ballot, on petition of at least two per cent of their respective party vote cast for representative in congress in their electoral district, and the one who shall receive the highest number of votes in the primary will be the nominee of his party for the office, and will be voted on in the usual manner in the June election.
