Curtis Goodwin died at the Prineville hotel Monday after a long illness from typhoid fever. The disease was contracted several weeks ago while he was confined in the county jail waiting trial on a charge of horse stealing. He was given medical treatment as soon as the fever asserted itself, but the disease conquered. The body was taken to Culver Tuesday morning where the burial services were held yesterday.

James Garlin, a brother of Mrs. Wm. Davenport, who was a resident of Prineville until last spring, was killed last week in a peculiar accident which occurred at Elkton, California. Mr. Garlin was riding a horse when the animal dropped dead, the heavy body of the animal falling on the unfortunate rider whose life was crushed out almost instantly.

John Grant was brought over from Bend Saturday and given the use of the parlor set in the county jail. Grant went into the dining room of a hotel at Bend about three o'clock one afternoon last week and was very persistent in his determination to sit and keep on sitting until supper was served. Before the bell rang, however, Grant was taken before Justice Lawrence and fined \$25 and given a present of a two days' jail sentence. Once inside the jail he gathered some loose shavings and sticks and set fire to them with the intention, as he afterwards said, of going up with the house in a cloud of smoke. He was rescued from the predicament in which he had placed himself and sent to Prineville. Monday morning Drs. Edwards and Belknap made an examination of Grant's mental qualities and with due medical propriety hesitated a few minutes before pronouncing the man insane. While those few minutes were elapsing Grant was given a little freedom and immediately went to a boarding house where he began ransacking the premises. His period of joviality was punctuated by a series of fist punches from the proprietor and forthwith Grant was again lodged in jail. About this time came the doctors' decision regarding Grant's sanity, and he will be taken to Salem to give vent to his uncultured feelings.
