## Business League Grows.

That the Citizens' Business League of Prineville will become a more important factor in the business circles of the city and do much towards furthering the progress of the community, is now assured. At present the organization represents a large percentage of the business interests in the district and it is the intention to place the league on a footing which will enable it to handle, or at least advance any project placed before it. It was through the efforts of the league alone that the new grade west of town was built last spring, and it is the purpose of the league now to shape itself so that larger projects can be taken hold of in the future if necessary. Smaller projects, of course, will not be overlooked, and anything which tends to the advancement, welfare and progress of the city and surrounding district will receive hearty co-operation and support.

Secretary M. R. Elliott spoke briefly at the meeting held in Athletic hall last Tuesday evening and he urgently requests all businessmen and residents who are not now members of the league to join the organization immediately, so that as large a voice as possible will be represented in the league's future work. The organization is a year old. It is the best which has ever been formed here with a similar purpose, and is reaching a point where it can exercise considerable power for the good of both the city and the surrounding country. For these reasons, Secretary Elliott says every man, whether in business or not, who has the interests of the county at heart, should enroll his name on the membership list.

The report of Treasurer A. H. Lippman showed a balance of \$100 still due for completing the grade, the total cost of which was \$2500. This balance due will be paid off by the monthly assessments amounting to \$1 for each member, the total membership of the league at present numbering 60.

## Senator Mitchell is Dead.

United States Senator John H. Mitchell died at the Good Samaritan Hospital in Portland at 11:35 last Friday morning. His death was caused directly from hemorrhages from the extraction of four teeth. He was past his 70th year and diabetic trouble had weakened him constitutionally so that his blood was so thin it would not coagulate.

## Madras Flour Mill is Running.

S. P. Conroy, general manager of the Madras Milling & Mercantile company, of Madras, was in the city today on a business trip. Mr. Conroy said the mill at Madras is running steadily and the output averaging 25 barrels per day. This is not the full capacity of the mill by half, but shortage of water prevents a larger output. The company is finding a ready disposal of all its flour and later on expects to have the plant running at its fullest capacity. The company is also manufacturing a breakfast food, the local demand for which up to the present time has been so heavy that no surplus is kept on hand. Forty-seven barrels of flour were shipped by the company to the city this morning.

The Madras plant is located in the heart of Crook county's wheat belt, and the latter is one which in a few years will be one of the heaviest producers of grain east of the Cascades. It will probably not be a great while before the present mill will have to be enlarged, as railroad connection means a greater exportation of Madras flour into surrounding districts.

## New Mill on the Ochoco.

Hawkins Bros. have finished the work of installing their new saw mill on the Hon ranch on the Ochoco. The mill is one which was on exhibition by the Averill machine company, of Portland, at the Lewis and Clark fair and was manufactured by the Russell company of Massillon, Ohio. Hawkins Bros. purchased the machinery while in Portland during the summer and are using an 18 horse power engine to drive the mill. One of the distinctive features of the plant is the automatic carriage feed. In a test made a few days ago 2400 feet of inch lumber was sawed in one hour. The mill owners are making arrangements to install a gang edger, but this will not be accomplished until later after the roofing and other minor details have been completed.

## Pudding for Some One.

Postmaster Summers is looking for a man in Crook county named G. D. Cardew. So far he has been unable to locate the person and a nice big Christmas pudding, which came all the way from England and safely passed muster at the custom house, is getting drier every day. The first of the week the local office received a box through the mail, postmarked England, with the declaration of customs manifest pasted on the outside and addressed to "G. D. Cardew, Crook county, Oregon, U. S. A." One one side were the words "Pudding and handkerchiefs." The package is evidently a Christmas remembrance to a man in this county whose location and identity have not yet been determined.

## Hunsaker Residence Burned.

Fire destroyed the farm house belonging to John Hunsaker on the Hunsaker ranch eight miles east of town on the Burns road last Friday morning. The flames started near the roof from a defective stove pipe. George Gibson and Gene Wimer were on the premises at the time but could do nothing to save the dwelling. Everything of value was carried out before the flames reached the first floor. The loss amounts to \$300.
