Sheriff Henry Smith, of Ukiah county, Cal., a cousin of Sheriff C. Sam Smith of this county, was shot and killed last Friday at Ukiah by an insane man named Frank Willard. A neat electrical display, the work of superintendent Adrian Crooks of the Light & Water company, has been arranged in one of the big windows of Wurzweller & Thomson's store, where an engine and generator are in full operation. The latter occupy the center of the window space together with a circular cut-off which lights and re-lights the incandescent lamps on the "Happy New Year" sign. Around the miniature power plant on a circular track runs a locomotive and two cars which, like "grown-ups," travel across bridges and through a long tunnel. A background of mountain scenery and real ballast on the railroad add to the attractiveness of the excellent work. A. B. Roller is responsible for the mountain landscape and other artistic features of the display.

At Robert Moore's blacksmith shop an equipment has recently been installed which makes easy work of setting tires on wagon and other wheels and does the job quicker and better than the method ordinarily employed. To heat the tire a brick furnace has been built 2 1/2 feet wide, seven feet long and six feet high. This will easily hold a dozen or more tires, which are held up from the fuel by cross bars in the furnace. All the tires can be heated at once with a minimum of fuel, doing away with the bother of building a ring of fire out of doors, which in stormy weather requires the constant attention of one man. Conveniently situated from the mouth of the furnace a tank has been built in the floor of the shop six feet square and three feet deep which is supplied by a hose from the city water works. Inside the tank has been constructed a close fitting platform which can be raised and lowered by means of a lever. The wagon wheel is made ready for the tire and laid flat on the platform which stands above the surface of the water. The heated tire is then taken from the furnace and placed on the wheel and with one motion of the lever the platform sinks into the water bath heating the wheel. The water is thus applied evenly to all points at once which is of vital importance in a good job of tire setting. When the tire has been sufficiently cooled to shrink it tight on the wheel the platform is again raised above the surface of the water, and the piece is then in shape to be hammered and finished. The whole scheme is so simple and works so well that it readily commends itself to practical workmen. The equipment is the work of J. J. Herrick, who is connected with the shop.
