It is Crook county's turn to elect a joint representative to the state legislature for the district comprising Crook, Grant, Lake and Klamath counties. It is furthermore high time that some one of the favored sons of Crook county is making his aspirations for this important office known, because the nominating petitions will have to be signed and filed in each of the four counties. Two years ago Crook county stood aside on this matter for the reason that Congressman Williamson was a resident of this county. Grant county has a joint holdover senator in J. A. Laycock. Lake county has Representative Lee Steiner and Klamath county Representative John V. Shoop. It is only fair and right that Crook county should furnish the material for the next joint representative. This county will have interests to protect at the next session of the legislature which will require the services of a champion familiar with all her needs and wholly loyal to her best interests. Who wants the job? To quote the entire speech—the first, last and only—of Representative Steiner, made at the session of the legislature which never organized, "What are we going to do?" This is a matter of vital importance to this county. There is no lack of good, honest business material for a candidate. It is time to use some of it. We must have a Crook county man in the next house of representatives.

The Pilot Butte Development Co. has filed notice with the State Engineer of appropriation of 2000 inches of water from the Deschutes river at Bend for electric power and other purposes. It is announced to be in accordance with the company's plan to impound the waters of the Deschutes by a dam that will form a reservoir covering 90 acres. Maybe and perhaps, but it is much more than likely that it is only a move on the part of A. M. Drake to hamper the D. I. & P. Co. in completing their irrigation systems. Drake is proving himself to be the champion knocker of the Deschutes valley and is much more fit for the president of an anti-development company. He has yet to show anything other than a dog in the manger policy.

A new construction camp of the Deschutes Irrigation & Power Co. has been organized for work on Lateral F of the Central Oregon canal under the able foremanship of L. C. Whitted. About thirty men are mustered.

Up to noon today there were registered on the County Register the names of 196 voters, with 23 of the 29 precincts in the county represented. There is a question in the minds of many as to whether a voter may sign more than one nominating petition for the same office. The law plainly states that he may sign as many petitions for the same office as he chooses, so long as they are of the party under which he registers.
