Light refreshments were served.

J. B. Cornett was in the city today from his stock ranch at Summit Prairie.

Thermometers in different parts of the city this week have registered a variety of temperatures, some making the weather several degrees colder than was necessary. The government thermometers in charge of C. I. Winick are as accurate as is possible to make them and the coldest weather these have registered was 1 degree below Wednesday night.

C. A. Whitsett is in the city from his ranch near Culver. Mr. Whitsett says the storm during the past week is likely to prove disastrous to the ranchers in that vicinity who had sowed fall grain. Most of this had a good start when the extreme cold weather and snow visited the community. The sprouts were cut down and the snow which was carried before a heavy wind afforded no protection from the cold.
