THE SQUARE DEAL.

It is only right that Crook county this year should give the western part of the county representation in the county court. It is the first time that an office has been asked for by this now rapidly developing section, and the first time that the district in question has brought forth a candidate for commissionership. Heretofore western Crook has had little to give in the general makeup of the county in general. The present year sees a material change in the opposite direction. The past 24 months has witnessed an unprecedented growth and development along the valley of the Deschutes. There are interests there and the people that have the right to demand representation. But it is not a question of might and right. Simply an exemplification of the "square deal." From a non-partisan standpoint western Crook right now is making its final step to the threshold as a mighty factor in the progress, development, upbuilding and legislation of things Central Oregon. As such she is entitled to a fair share of recognition.

The argument is thrown against Mr. Bayley that he is not a heavy tax payer. Even so, when Crook county was first formed and her first officers stepped into their positions there were mighty few of them could boast of either heavy possessions or the payment of large taxes. Crook county's future is primarily dependent upon her new population. Crook county would be that much better off were the new population ten times what it figures today. And the new population needs, expects and has a right to ask for representation because the day is not far distant when the new will outnumber the old.

One of the best tax collections in the history of the sheriff's office will go on record for this year, more particularly for the fifteen days beginning with March 1, when the collections began on the 1905 roll, and March 15, when days of grace were ended so far as rebates are concerned. Up to that time there had been collected in the two weeks a total sum of \$48,568.99 out of the total assessment of \$71,151.86, leaving a balance of delinquent taxes amounting to \$22,582.87.

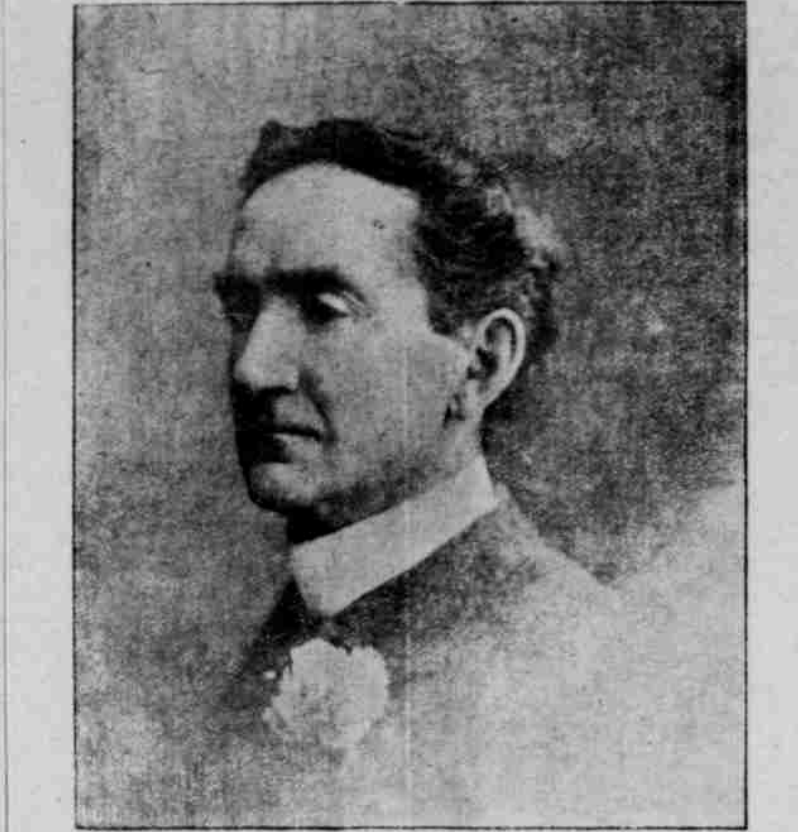

Republican Candidate for United States Senator
 CHAMPION OF STATEMENT ONE

Jonathan Bourne, Jr., candidate before the Republican primaries for the nomination of United States Senator in congress, for the long term, commencing March 4, 1907, was born in New Bedford, Mass., February 23, 1855, was a member of the class of 1877 at Harvard University; came to Portland May 16, 1878; was a Republican member of the Oregon Legislature in the session of 1885, and the extra session of 1886; was one of Oregon's delegates to the Republican National Convention of 1888, and Oregon's member of the Republican National Committee from 1888 to 1892, and a delegate to the Republican National Convention of 1892, and was elected as a Mitchell Republican to the Oregon legislature in 1896.

Mr. Bourne has been more prominently identified with the development of the mineral resources of Oregon than any other man in the state, having expended in the last 20 years over \$1,000,000 of his own money in the acquisition and development of Oregon mines.

While Mr. Bourne has had his residence and main office in Portland since 1878, he has had another office at New Bedford, Mass., and has carried on the business of his father's estate since 1889, which makes him familiar with many of the large interests and leading men in the East. These qualifications, in conjunction with his energy, originality, executive ability and experience in business and political affairs pre-eminently qualify him for making an able and influential senator for the state of Oregon.

Mr. Bourne has always favored extending the direct power of the people over their government as far as possible. He was one of the leading spirits in the Initiative and Referendum movement from 1896 until it was approved by the voters at the June election in 1902. In 1904 he was a member of the executive committee of the Direct Primary Nomination League, and holds the same position with the People's Power League at this time. In all these movements he has been one of the few to guarantee the necessary expenses of preparing and proposing their measures to the people.

He says that the choice of United States Senator should be by direct vote of the people, and that the legislature should be compelled to elect the man the people select. To accomplish this result, he is championing statement No. 1 of the primary election law as the only method by which public opinion may be crystallized and made effective upon the Legislature.

 - "Liberal Appropriations for Panama Canal, Coast Defenses, River and Harbor Improvements, including Columbia and Willamette Rivers Coos, Yaquina and other Oregon Harbors, Celilo Canal, Government Canal at Oregon City.
 - "Fair Share of Irrigation Fund for Oregon.
 - "Loyal Support for Successful Candidates.
 - "Rigid Enforcement Statement One.
 - "Roosevelt for Second Elective Term.
