At the present time injunction suits are pending in the California courts wherein the applicants (policy holders in the Pacific Mutual) are seeking to prevent the consolidation of the two companies. Every right thinking man posted on life insurance matters hopes in his heart of hearts that their prayer will prevail. The policy holders in the Pacific Mutual have everything to lose and nothing to gain by the union.

You are told that for each bond sold security to the amount of the face of the bond is promptly hypothecated with the Treasurer of California. What security? Securities that belong to the life insurance tail of this hybrid life insurance investment bond concern. Just robbing Peter to pay Paul! That's all! Your money here at home will earn you 10 per cent in safe and legitimate investment. Do not be carried away by glittering generalities and the hope of finding a fortune for the mere asking by purchasing one of these so-called bonds. If the proposition made is what it is cracked up to be, then the great State of California with its millions of wealth ought to be a splendid field for these people to operate in and not an isolated section in the State of Oregon.
