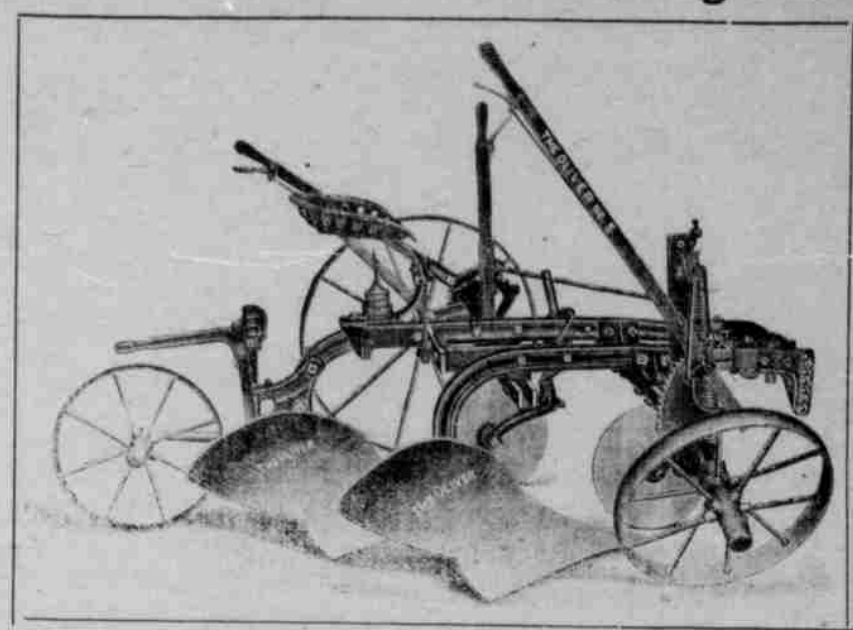
To the Public.
