**Death of an Old Settler.**

Knox Huston, a well known pioneer of Crook county who established his residence here in 1879, died at his home in this city last Tuesday afternoon after an illness extending over a period of two weeks. At the time of his death he was a candidate for the nomination to the office of county surveyor, a position which he had formerly held for ten years.

Deceased was born in Washington county, Indiana, March 10, 1839, and in that state and Iowa received his education, entering Cornell college in Iowa in 1858. Two years later he traveled via Isthmus of Panama to California and moved to Lane county, Oregon, in 1862. Until 1878 Mr. Huston was engaged in teaching school, then secured a band of sheep and drove them across the mountains to Crook county where he moved his family and continued in the stock raising business until 1900 when he was elected to the office of county surveyor, a position he held for five successive terms.

Mr. Huston married Miss Victoria Childers in 1866, who survives him. The children are: Mrs. Maggie O'Neil and Mrs. Sarah Thomson of this city; Henry Y., of this city; Wade H. and Knox D., of Ashwood, and Jessie L. of Baker City.

Funeral services were held at the Union church this afternoon at 2 o'clock and were conducted by the Rev. Brooks, of Portland. Interment took place in the Union cemetery.
