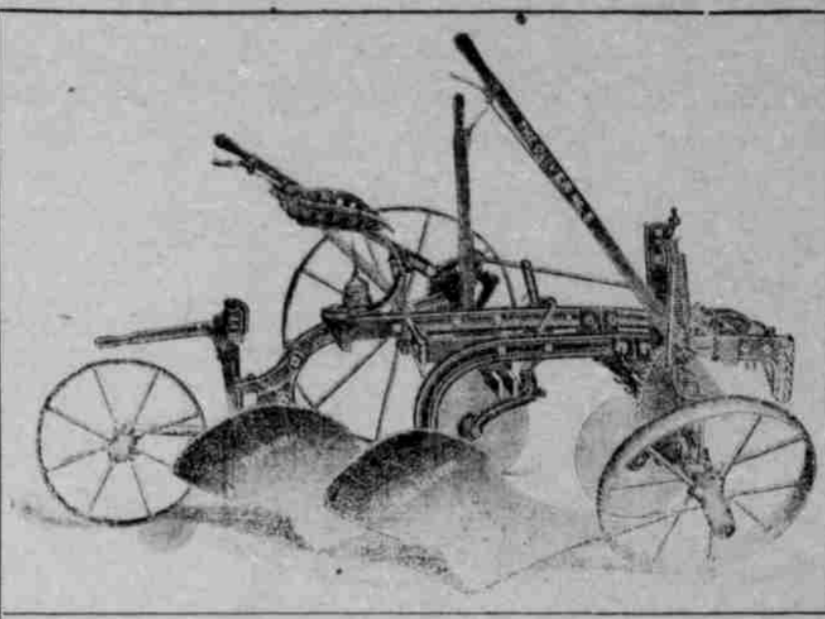
Fine Piano Purchased.
