Shipments of Crook County Cattle.

During the past season 2,147 head of alfalfa and 550 head of grass hay fed had been shipped from Crook county via way of Shasliko. This is a considerable amount of increase over the shipments of the same class of stock of last season, and marks a new era in the stock business of this county.

Another very important matter in the stock business of the county is the importation by B. Gram, H. L. Friday and C. S. McCorkie, of Trout creek, of thoroughbred Devon cattle. These cattle are said to be fine bred as well as good milk cows. They are dark red in color, blocky build, mature quickly and good runners. Civic Improvement League.

At a meeting of the different organizations of our city held in the Union church, April 28, the Civic Improvement League saw the light of day.

Mrs. Ada Milligan acted as chairman of this meeting and on motion Mrs. Anna Winnek was placed as secretary for the afternoon. The secretary called the roll with several orders responding, and all were in hearty co-operation with this measure.

Election of officers for this grand movement was in order. Mrs. Wilma Belknap was elected president, Mrs. Julia Lytle secretary, Mrs. Anna Winnek treasurer. Such a league must have a constitution and the president appointed Prof. Strange and Mrs. Ada Milligan as a committee to look after that.

Many timely suggestions were offered in the line of improvements, among them was the movement for a public fountain, improvement of the city park, beautifying the streets, and a general day of housecleaning for the entire city, all of which will come up later under the direction of the league. Mayor Wurzwelger was unable to be present, but a representative voiced that the Mayor's heart was in the work.

Outlaw Smith is Shot Dead.

With courage unsurpassed, Harry Draper, accompanied by Deputy Sheriff Mendenhall, of Multnomah County, Detective Vaughn, of Portland, and Sheriff Culver, of Marion County, Wednesday morning followed the bloodhounds into the brush where Frank Smith lay concealed, and fired a bullet through the brain of the outlaw of Officers Hamilton, Sheriff Shaver and Captain O. D. Henderson. Without firing a shot or even drawing his revolver, Smith met his death. Crouched behind a log in a patch of brush a half mile south of New Era, he had countless opportunities to take the lives of pursuers who passed along the railroad track about 30 feet away, yet for reasons which will never be known he lay quietly in his hiding place, and met death like a dog.

Smith was killed a few minutes after 11 o'clock Wednesday morning at the end of a ten-day's career of crime equalled in Oregon only by the deeds of Harry Tracy and David Merrill. His record includes the robbery of the postoffice at Troutdale, April 22, his escape from the Portland City Jail April 23 by swinging his hand over a wall along an electric wire 40 feet from the ground, his robbery of a jewelry store and shooting of Policeman Hamilton at Oregon City in the early hours of April 24, the robbery of a store at Canby on the 25th, the shooting of Sheriff Shaver, of Clackamas County, and Captain O. D. Henderson, at Woodburn, on the 27th, and a successful effort at concealment for four days, ending with his appearance at Canby early on the morning of May 1, and his death at New Era a few hours later.
