Judge Bradshaw must have laughed pretty heartily when he read in the complaint filed by some of the tax payers in western Crook county against the county court contracting for a new court house that "said county has a good, substantial, commodious, and convenient court house well adapted and sufficient for the transaction of all the business of the county." Judge Bradshaw, by the way, for several years past has been one of the vigorous kickers against the crowded and inconvenient conditions every session of his court is subjected to in Prineville. He could probably bring a little testimony to bear, too, on the dispatch with which records and other papers are found in a court house which has little or no provision for the safe and systematic keeping of records and documents. That point in the complaint must have appealed to him with considerable force. Perhaps the Bend tax payers thought of this beforehand and so included it that it might bring out in strong relief the consistency of the other allegations.

While Bend and the Bend Bulletin are wearing off their teeth in a peach fuzz effort to do something, bust up this that and the other thing and otherwise make the earth ashamed of itself for being in existence, all on account of the new court house proposition, right at home over there trouble is brewing about some other taxes and the price of a new school building they taxed themselves for, and just now some one wants to get his money out of that building and have the school board sue the contractor. Little school building cost about \$1000 more than it should have and the pig in the fence has caught his tail between the boards of lumber. The Bulletin ought to straighten this matter out satisfactorily. The Bulletin is a very truthful sheet.

Between \$50 and \$75 it will cost each individual tax payer to build a new court house, remarks the pedantic Bend Bulletin. We'll be easy now and split the difference. Call it \$60 apiece. Fifteen hundred tax payers at \$60 each, \$90,000! Contract price shall not exceed \$42,000, says the court. There are more than enough funds on hand to foot the bill. No additional taxes will be levied. The Bulletin is a very truthful sheet.

The Bend Bulletin says a petition signed by over 200 tax payers has been filed against the move to build a new court house. By the way, the petitioners for the court house represent something in excess of \$24,000, over half of the taxes paid by county residents. How much do those 200 pay?

**Road Bids Wanted.**  
The county court of Crook county, Or., will receive bids up to 10 o'clock a. m. July 6, 1906, for the construction of a wagon road in Hay Creek Canyon, leading from in front of C. **READY FOR THE CELEBRATION**

Initial steps were taken this week towards perfecting the arrangements for the baseball tournament and Fourth of July celebration in Prineville which will cover four days beginning July 1. Practically \$700 has been raised for the purses and the general committee in charge is composed of T. Baldwin, Dr. J. H. Rosenberg and Duncan Macleod. The committee on horse races consists of John Combs, Will Wurzwiler and J. W. Henderson. George Summers will have the arrangement of the children's sports and the program for the other sports for the celebration will be in charge of C. L. Winnek and M. E. Brink. The trap shoot, in which county sportsmen are expected to take part, will be in charge of B. Millorn and Max Wurzwiler. Arrangements for the parade in which the band will take part are being made by the committee consisting of Mrs. H. P. Belknap, Mrs. C. L. Winnek, A. H. Lippman and Oliver Powell.

Of the money raised for the purses, \$450 will be used in the baseball purses and will be divided as follows: First purse of \$250 to the team winning the majority of games; \$150 to the second, and \$50 to the third.

The balance of the money raised will be used in purses for other events and the apportionment will be made as soon as the program has been completed.

On the evening of the Fourth, Athletic hall will be the scene of a dance and supper given by the Ladies Annex. The members of the latter organization will begin soon to fit up the banquet room on the first floor and supper will be served there. The members of the baseball team will also give a dance on the evening of Saturday, June 30.

Wrongful assessment of W. R. Booth clerk ordered credit sheriff on roll 1905 with \$4 as per affidavit.

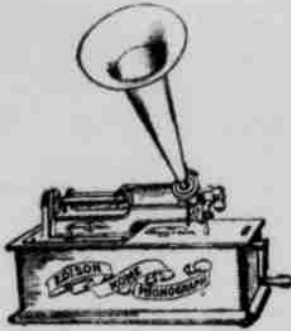
