

EXCELLENT WORK DONE

At Prineville Summer Schools.

SUPT. TRAVER HERE

He is Considered One of the
Best Institute Workers
in the State.

A visitor at the Crook County High School would find the majority of the Crook county teachers hard at work. Superintendent Dinwiddie, Professors Strange and Goodin have conducted a successful Normal school during July, which has been of great benefit to the teachers. Were it not for this opportunity to prepare for examination, the teachers would be obliged to stand the extra expense of going to another county for this work. The teachers are pleased with the present condition and with the character of work that has been offered. This extra study will benefit the schools of the county, since the teachers will do more efficient work.

During the present week Superintendent Dinwiddie is conducting the regular annual institute. Superintendent L. R. Traver of the Pendleton Public Schools came in from Pendleton Monday and is giving special work in methods this week. His subjects are: Phonics, Primary Reading, Language, Arithmetic, Course of Study and Methods.

Judging from the notes being taken by the teachers, Superintendent Traver is giving some practical work which will find a place in the school rooms of the county.

The present summer school is a departure from the ordinary plan pursued in the other counties, but it is a pronounced success, and Superintendent Dinwiddie proposes to continue the school next summer. The teachers of the county sincerely hope that this may be done.

The work of the institute will be followed by three or four rousing local institutes which will be held during the winter. Superintendent Dinwiddie will be assisted by Professor Strange, Miss Goodin and several of the prominent teachers of the county. These meetings will keep the educational work of this county at a white heat, and produce good results for the boys and girls.

The present law requires all teachers to attend the county institute. The Crook county teachers are manifesting a spirit to obey the law, not only in the legal sense but in a professional sense, and have responded by attending the present institute almost in a body. This attendance means that many of the teachers must travel long distances, but they feel that they are being fully repaid.

A pleasant feature of the institute was the invitation of Mr. Adamson to the teachers to visit his drugstore and ice cream parlor on Tuesday afternoon. The teachers were all present and enjoyed some of the best ice cream ever manufactured in Oregon. It is rumored that as high as four dishes were served to one individual. Mr. Adamson served some fine candy and ice cold drinks.

Superintendent Dinwiddie thanked Mr. Adamson on behalf of the teachers. Mr. Adamson's generous treat was highly appreciated, and it is certain that his period has been the most interesting on the program.

A stranger in the county could not help noting the excellent interest in all matters educational; the splendid school system and especially the grand work being done by the County High School. This school furnishes the best advantage at the lowest possible cost. An examination of the attendance shows that Crook County boys and girls are not slow to take advantage of the excellent school. The attendance in the school will reach 200 pupils in a short time.

Instead of grieving over the fact that Crook county is somewhat distant from Eugene or Corvallis, the people have decided to bring the best schools to the county.

Professor Strange is one of the best educators in the entire state. However, his splendid work is evident and needs no commendation. It is very fortunate that he and his able assistant, Miss Goodin, has been retained for the next two years. Both of these educators have had several opportunities to work elsewhere at good salaries, but they have consented to remain two years longer, at least, in Prineville. Their work is well known and is well supported by the people of the county.

Crook County Schools are in excellent condition, and compare well with any county in the state. All this is due in a great measure to the untiring efforts of Superintendent Dinwiddie, his excellent corps of teachers, and the influence of the Crook County High School.

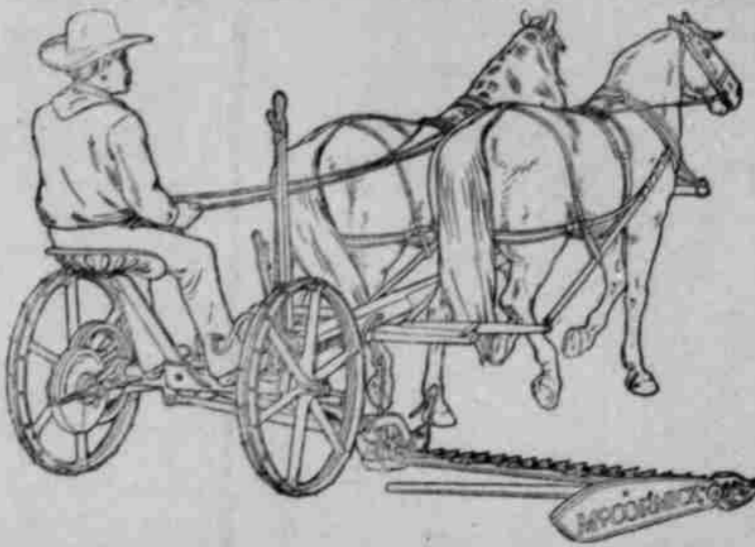
