Fish and Game Laws.

We give below a brief outline of the fish and game law:

Spotted lawn—closed at all times.
Buck deer—closed from November 1 of year to August 15 of the following year.

Female deer—closed from November 1 to September 15 of the following year. Limit—five deer in any one open season.

Elk—closed from October 15 to September 15 of the following year. It is unlawful to kill prairie chickens before the fall of 1900. Grouse and pheasants of all kinds, and sage hens may be hunted from August 15 to December 1. Limit—ten birds in one day.

Ducks, geese and swan—closed from February 1 to September 1 of each year.

Fishing—Trout may be caught only with hook and line. Limit of size, not less than five inches. Limit of catch, 125 in one day. Night fishing prohibited.

The lawful season for the killing of male deer opens August 15, and the season for female deer will open September 1. The season for both closes on November 1st. It is against the law to hunt or kill deer at night between one hour after sunset and one hour before sunrise. No person may kill more than five deer during the season. Hunting deer with dogs is prohibited.
