This reserve is situated in Crook and Klamath counties, extending from a point about 12 miles south of Bend southward to the Klamath Indian Reservation. This reserve comprises the greater part of 72 townships, extending in irregular form the Cascade Reserve easterly to range 17 and north and south from township 19 to township 33.

She will take the fifth grade. This makes seven teachers in the graded department of the Prineville Public School.

The Oregon Agricultural College at Corvallis will offer this winter, as usual, two special courses along agricultural lines, which will be designated The Short Course in Agriculture, and the Special Dairy Course. The Short Course in Agriculture will open on Tuesday, January 8, 1907, at 9:30 a. m., and continue two weeks, closing on Friday, January 18. The course consists of a series of popular lectures along lines suited to aid horticulturists, dairymen, and others engaged in agricultural pursuits in developing the great natural resources of our State. The lectures are supplemented by laboratory work under the auspices of experts, who strive to make the course thoroughly practical by adapting the work as far as possible to the needs of each individual. The Special Dairy Course will also open on January 8, 1907, and will continue six weeks, closing on February 15, 1907. The purpose of this course is to familiarize students with the modern forms of dairy apparatus, and teach the underlying principles of the production, care, and manufacture of milk into butter and cheese.
