Died.

At Salem, Oregon, November 7th, Mrs. James O. Douthitt, aged 85 years. The remains were brought to Prineville for burial and were laid beside her husband in Union cemetery November 13th. The maiden name of the deceased was Louisa Jane Thompson. She was born near Springfield, Mo., September 19, 1820. At 13 years of age she crossed the plains with her parents with an ox team, and settled in Linn county, Oregon. She was married to James O. Douthitt July 5, 1863. They lived on the Old Donation claim near Harrisburg until 1882, when they moved to Eastern Oregon and settled on Hay Creek. In 1890 they moved to Trout Creek, where she has since lived with her two sons, her husband having departed this life February 2, 1897.

At an early age she professed faith in Christ and for nearly forty years has lived a conscientious, christian life. She united with the Protestant Episcopal church. Deceased leaves one daughter and two sons; two sisters and one brother and a host of friends to mourn her loss.

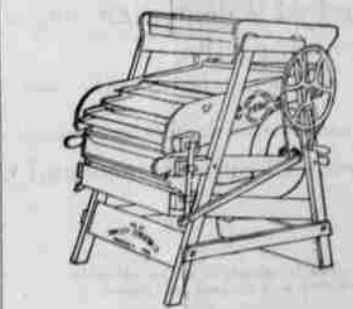
Gateway Mining Co.

B. Gatewood, manager of the Mayflower mines at Howard, accompanied by John A. McLean and T. W. Zimmerman, returned recently from Seattle. Mr. McLean, who is a mining engineer, comes to take the superintendency of the mine where considerable work will be done along various lines of development and improvement this fall and winter. Mr. Gatewood spent a few hours at Shaniko where the first carload of concentrates from the Mayflower will be shipped to the Tacoma smelter. The load lacks but five tons of being complete and these are being hauled overland at the present time. Besides being the first from the mine itself, the concentrates are the first ever shipped out of Crook county. Mr. Gatewood said the carload of 30 tons would average \$100 a ton, making a total of \$3000 for the first shipment.

Extensive additions are to be made at the Howard property during the coming few months. A saw mill, hoisting plant and electrical generating plant will be installed and a number of new buildings erected as soon as lumber can be obtained from the mill. This will be done to accommodate the families of the miners at present working in the Mayflower and those which will come early in the spring when the management will put on a working force of between 50 and 75 men. The electrical plant will furnish light for both the day and night shifts which will be at work next spring, and the hoisting plant will handle the ore taken from the shaft which is to be sunk in a short time.

Mr. Gatewood is very sanguine of the results to be obtained at the property next season. The mine is already on a paying basis and with an addition of five new stamps, which will be installed as soon as they can be shipped to the ground, and a heavy increase in the working force it is fully believed that the Mayflower will soon be on a par with other mines on the Pacific coast which from a money making basis have long since forced their way to the front.
