in which Zell was killed, and his wife, rather delicate and refined little woman, outraged thereafter, I was amazed that the men who were called to the scene an hour or so afterwards, could take Shepherd in custody and calmly wait for the arrival of the Sheriff.  
When that little woman came back after having gone for help, with hair streaming, dressed in nothing but a loose wrapper, having ridden away bare-footed and bare-legged, and falling from her horse screamed with grief and terror: "There is the man! That is the man who killed my Ben!" It was fortunate for Shepherd that a very quiet, cool-headed man was in control of the situation.  
Judge Frazer concludes as follows: The case being such an atrocious one, and Shepherd having shown such a fiendish disposition, having not only murdered Zell and outraged his wife, but having shown a desire afterwards to forever blacken her character, in my mind he is not entitled to pity. He is clearly not insane, at least in a legal sense, although he is somewhat stupid.

Cattlemen should rejoice at the condition of the cattle market at Portland. Today's Journal says: "The cattle market is doing things. Receipts are again quite fair, but demand is showing a constant increase. On every side the cattle market is showing improvement. Today's price is 25c higher for best steers and cows. The former has reached the high point at \$4.25, while cows and heifers are firm today at \$3.60 to 3.25. The same figure remains for stockers and feeders."

Prof. A. C. Strange, who has been principal of the Crook County High School for a number of years, has placed his resignation in the hands of the school board. Mr. Strange made this announcement to his pupils the other day. He leaves Prineville to accept the principalship of The Dalles High School. The position is a better paying one and much as we dislike to lose him he cannot be blamed for bettering himself. Mr. Strange has labored hard and earnestly for our high school and his efforts have made it one of the best in the state. His successor has not yet been announced. It is not likely that he will take up his work at The Dalles until after the holidays.

Prineville has long needed a place where dramas and other entertainments can be given. To satisfy this need the public-spirited members of the Ladies' Annex have undertaken the erection at one end of the club gymnasium a stage ample in size for any performance and with commodious dressing rooms. Scenery will be provided sufficient for any ordinary program and it is hoped the stage will be in frequent use. The greater part of the credit for this is due the ladies of the Annex who so often surprised us with enterprises designed for civic good. The first use of the stage will probably be the opera "Pinafore" given as a benefit for the high school piano fund Friday December 21st. Seats will be provided for all and the hall will be made as comfortable as possible. All are urged to come and thus encourage and help two good institutions and and two good purposes, the club in building its new stage and the school in paying for its new piano.
