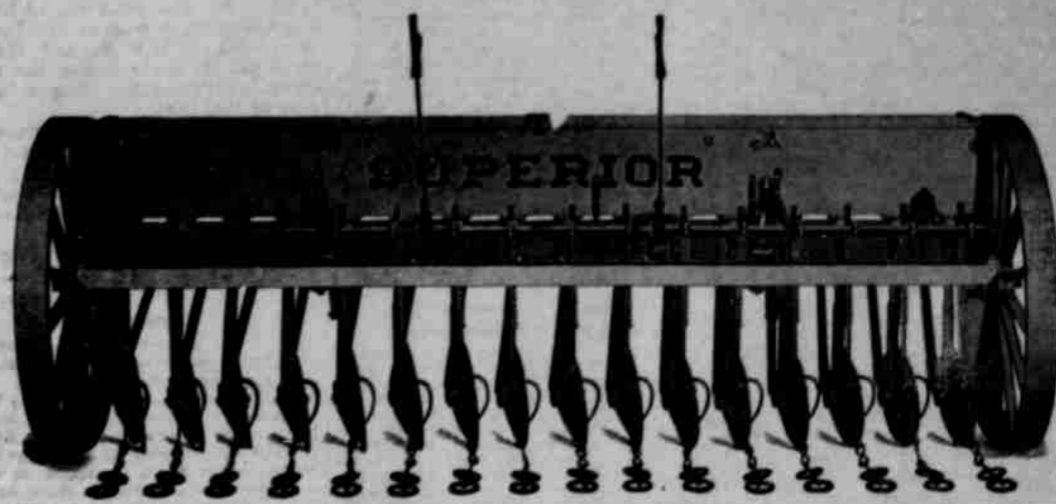

A heavy scantling fell and struck him on the head and neck. His spine was injured and his arms became paralyzed, besides receiving bad cuts on the head. His trip to Prineville Tuesday was the first time he had been out of the house for weeks. He is slowly regaining the use of his arms. The doctors told him that had he been struck half an inch higher up he would have been killed instantly.
