The City Election.

The approaching city election is the all-absorbing topic of conversation on the streets these days. Next Monday a mayor, three councilmen, a recorder and a marshal are to be chosen by the electors of the city. The Journal has no ax to grind and shall heartily cooperate with any body of wide-awake, progressive citizens who have the welfare of the city at heart. We want men who are not afraid to act when action is necessary for the best interests of the community. We are approaching the time when Prineville must assert its claims, and make good the assertion, that it is one of the best towns in the state. We need as a municipality many improvements and the coming year is a good time to begin the work. Nor is the material welfare of the city all that is necessary to be looked after. Civic righteousness and moral cleanliness are always to be desired and should be promoted by those in authority. It means much to the individual and the home. The retiring council has made a good record and we trust the incoming board will keep up the good work.

Qualifications of Electors.

In order that there may be no doubt or confusion in the mind of the voter next Monday, we quote that part of the city ordinance referring to elections for his benefit. It reads: "No person shall be qualified to vote at any election under this act who is not a qualified elector under the laws of this state, and who has not resided in the city at least six months next preceding the time of such election, and who has neglected or refused to pay any poll tax or fine assessed or imposed under authority of this charter."
