The little three-months-old baby of Orange Hodges was found dead in bed Wednesday morning. The cause of death was heart failure.

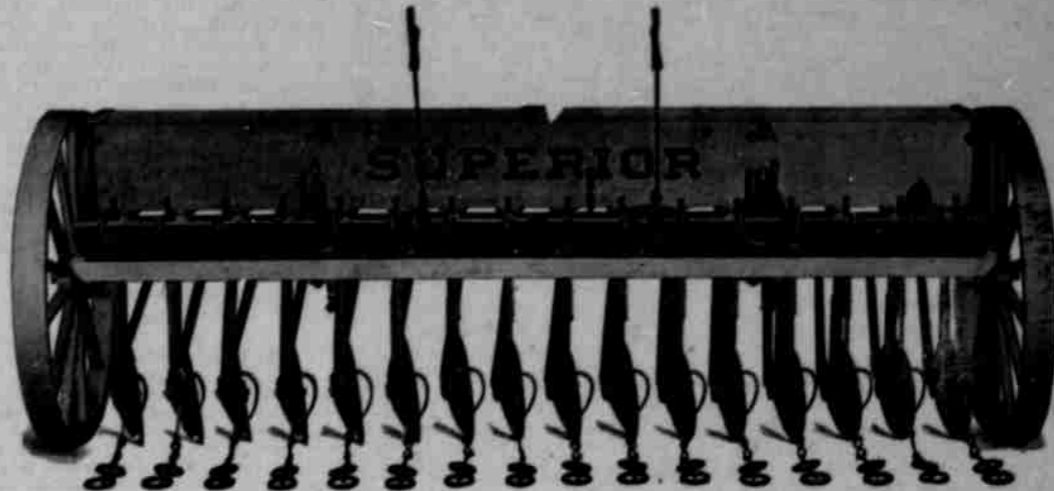
The Rev. Mr. Bass has just closed a successful series of meetings at Madras. He has organized a Christian church with a good membership.
