More Forest Reserves.

Prior to signing the agricultural appropriation bill, which contains Senator Fulton's amendment prohibiting the creation of forest reserves in the northwestern states except by the authority of congress, President Roosevelt on March 4th issued a proclamation creating 32 forest reserves in the six states affected by the Fulton amendment. The proclamation adds a little over 4,000,000 acres to the reserve area of Oregon. Some 977,000 acres are added to the Blue Mountain reserves in Eastern Oregon.

Criticism of the land and forest service made by Senators Fulton and Heyburn have interested many Eastern Senators, who previously paid little attention to land legislation, and it is because of their sympathy with men from the West that all drastic land bills are being killed. Criticism of the forestry administration have, for the time being at least, effectually killed the bill proposing to create forest reserves in New England and the South Atlantic States. Eastern Senators fear such reserves would do more harm than good.

Every senator and congressman from the west has been flooded with letters of protest against the unprecedented manner in which the government has administered the public land laws.

Dr. Belknap, of Crook county, is a member who is not at all self-assertive, yet he has made a very valuable representative through his attention to business and the confidence his fellows have in his judgment. He is a native Oregonian, having been born in Benton county in 1856. In 1876 he went to Crook county to do for himself and engaged in the stock business until 1883, when he decided to study medicine and went to Bellevue, New York, where he graduated in 1886. Since that time he has been a practicing physician in Prineville. He was mayor of the town for three terms, assessor of the county once and superintendent of the Crook county schools. He has a charming wife and four sons whose ages are scattered along from 10 to 20 years. Dr. Belknap has made but few speeches yet some of the members who talk less are really listened to more than those who talk oftener. —Pendleton Tribune.
