Push Oregon.

Theodore B. Wilcox, chairman of the executive committee of the Portland Commercial Club and president of the Oregon Development League, is making an appeal for \$36,000 to advertise Oregon. He is convinced from results already obtained and believing that greater benefits may still be received from a judiciously conducted newspaper advertising campaign, has entered upon a plan to bring the resources and opportunities of Oregon forcibly to the notice of 7,000,000 people at once. A remarkably strong advertisement has been prepared to print in the rural papers of this country.

Mr. Wilcox says that this advertisement has been drawn to benefit the entire state as is shown by the sub-headings in black type. The features are agriculture, dairying, logged-off lands, fruits, wheat, irrigation, reclamation fund, timber, mines, hops, nurseries, livestock, poultry. The theme of the advertisement is the cheap rail rates to Portland, Oregon, during the colonial period. Correspondence that originates from the publication of this advertisement throughout the country will be furnished in separate copies to each of the 64 organizations of the Oregon Development League.

The Hon. J. H. Ackerman, superintendent of public instruction for the state of Oregon, believes that the splendid opportunity afforded the people of the Middle West to visit almost every point in Oregon at the low rate of \$25 should be put before the schools, and that all teachers in the state should not only inform themselves of the facts, but impart those facts to their students. This rate of \$25 includes all Missouri River points, St. Paul and contiguous territory; the rate from St. Louis is \$30, and from Chicago \$33, and tickets will be on sale from March 1 to April 30.

There is an absolute hunger for information about Oregon throughout all portions of the United States.

Something should be done by the commercial bodies of Prineville to direct the attention of settlers to the advantages of Crook county. We have the best country of earth and why not let the people know it?
