The orchestra, consisting of five pieces, was under the direction of A. H. Kennedy. It was up to its usual high standard of excellence. The receipts were \$102.40; expenses, \$128.30, leaving a deficit of \$25.90.

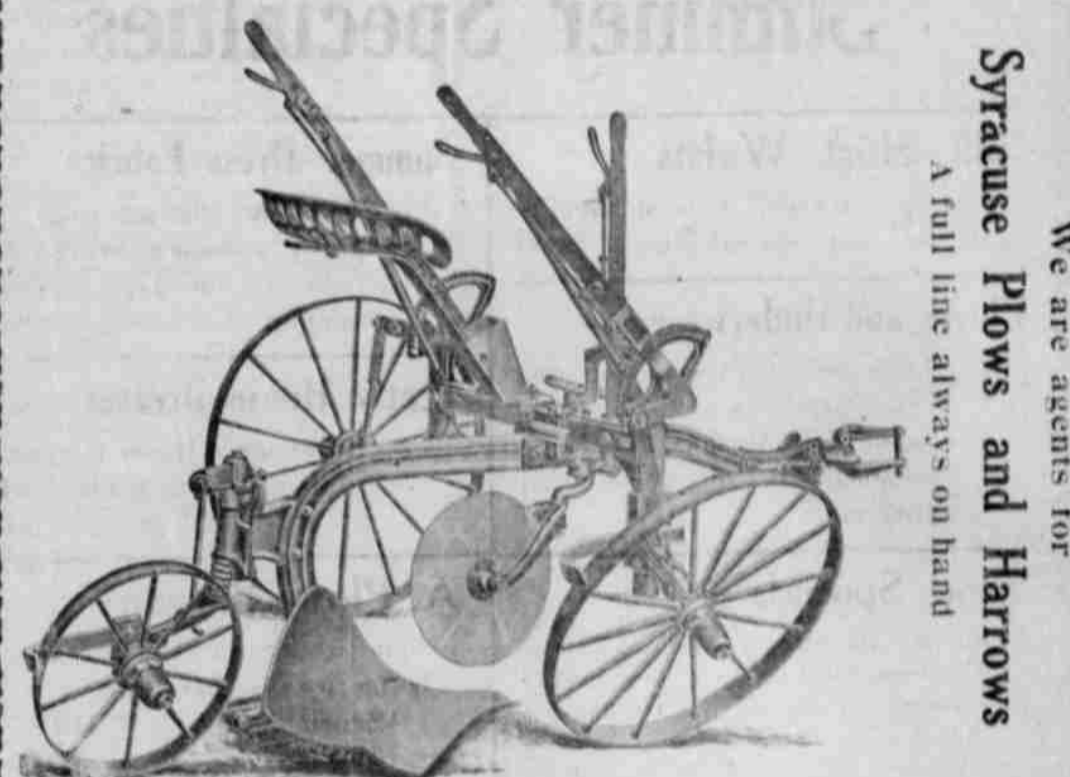

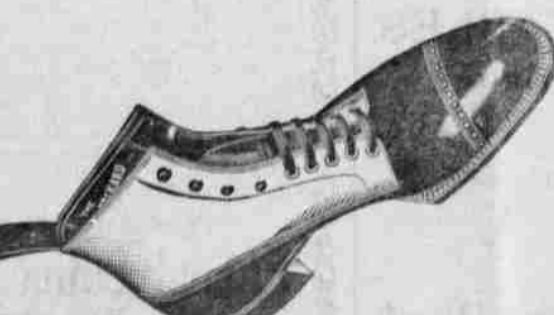
