Died, at his home in Prineville, Monday, April 8, 1907. D. F. Powell, aged 78.

Another name has been stricken from our ever lessening roll of old settlers. "Uncle Dan," as he was familiarly called, came to Crook county thirty-three years ago and has lived here ever since. He was a member of the Baptist church, a man of generous impulses and never forgot the hospitable ways of the pioneer. He had a kindly word for everybody and in his own quiet way rounded out a ripe old age.

He was married to Miss Jane Cary of Linn county in 1863, who survives him. Five children were born to them. The four living are Mrs. Minta Prine of Lewiston, Idaho; Mrs. Elva Allen of Eugene; Farmer and Archie Powell of this city. He was buried in the Union cemetery Tuesday and was followed to his last resting place by a large number of friends.

There are thousands of acres in Crook county awaiting the touch of scientific farming and the day is not far distant when the idle land will be dotted with homes, churches and school houses. 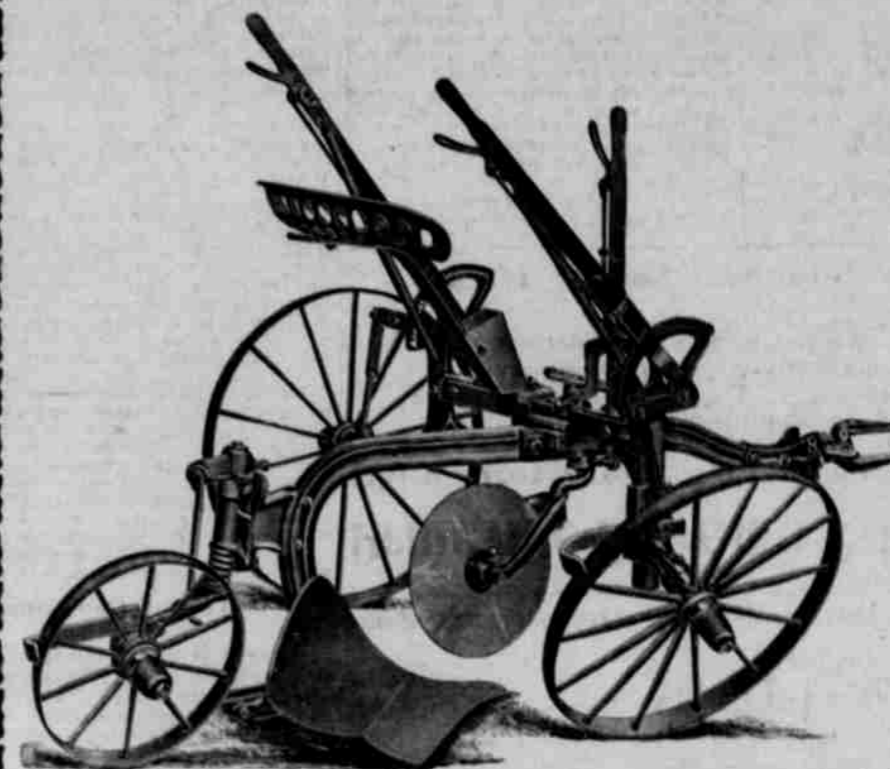
