

NOTHING SEEN OF H. M. STREET

No Trace of the Dead Man Found.

PREMISES EXAMINED

The Little Daughter Saw Only a Cloud of Dust and Rocks.

Sheriff Elkins returned yesterday from a visit to the ranch of Homer M. Street. The sheriff says that there have been no new developments in the terrible accident. An examination was made of the premises and pieces of flat rock and fragments of dynamite were found within a radius of twenty feet of the place where the explosion took place. A hole was made in the ground in which a large dish pan could be placed. The sack in which Mr. Street carried the stuff home was still in evidence and bore unmistakable marks of having been chewed by some animal. The sack was picked up about a hundred feet from the log under which the dynamite was placed for safe keeping. The horse that Mr. Street rode was also examined. It was found to be badly mutilated. The left front foot was blown off and it is thought that it must have been this foot that touched off the powder. The right leg was broken and a big hole was torn in the belly of the animal just back of the scinck.

The little 13-year-old daughter who was present when the accident happened has but a vague idea of the occurrence. She and the dogs were out after a squirrel when the father was attracted to the scene. She says that as her father was coming up to where she stood she saw a cloud of dust and rocks and felt sick. The little girl was evidently stunned by the shock for a few seconds because the next thing she remembers was that she saw something going down the river but it kept bobbing so she could not tell what it was. She could not say whether it was her father or the horse he rode.

The people of the community in which Mr. Street lived have done everything possible for the family. They are deeply sensible of the great bereavement especially at this time when another member is shortly expected.
