The cost of getting this water to the land is estimated at \$6000. There is 250 acres in cultivation this season. It is planted to wheat, oats and barley and looks fine. 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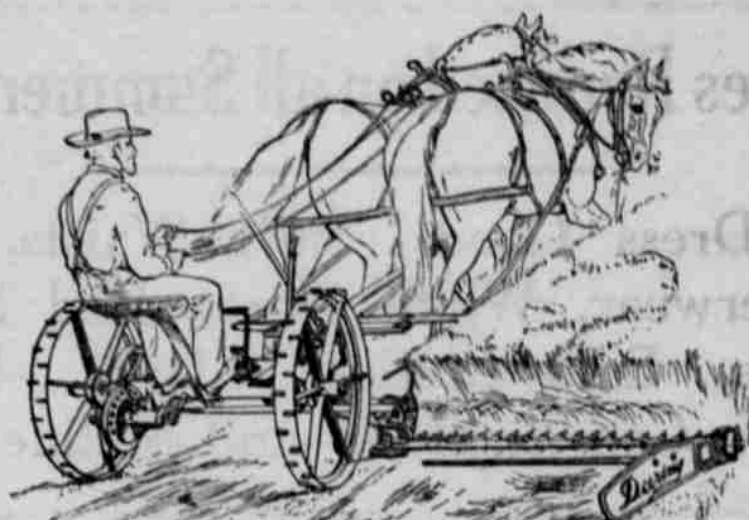
