

CREAMERY PLANT UNDER WAY

Machinery Expected in a Few Days.

Construction work was begun the first of the week on the creamery that is to be established at Prineville. It will be rapidly pushed to completion. The work is in charge of L. B. Ziemer of Monroe & Shelton, creamery dealers, of Portland. Mr. Ziemer is an experienced man at the work of constructing creamery plants and his personal supervision will be given to the one to be built here. The machinery for the plant has left Shaniko and will arrive here in a few days. The committee appointed by the stockholders to look up a site for the new industry decided on a place in the northwest part of town. The water supply and all details have been carefully worked out.

Considering the present prices of the creamery product it would seem that this enterprise should become a paying proposition from the start.

Mr. Ziemer expects to have the plant in running order in less than a month and a thorough trial will be given it before the autumn.
